Www.elcome to the Winter edition of the Johnstone High School newsletter. A lot has happened since the Autumn edition which came out on the 11th of November.

School Life

We have had a football trip, run by Mr Stevenson, off to see Man City vs Everton on a very cold and snowy weekend in December. We've also had success in Art competitions

and a special mention to Heather whose beautiful photography work represents May in the Renfrewshire Council calendar for 2019. Our charitable fundraising keeps going at a pace. The S6 put in a great effort for Children in Need with dressing up in PJs for the day, shaving heads and waxing legs, raising over £300. We've also had coffee mornings, a non-uniform day and S1 disco for our 4 house charities. Plans are now underway for Comic Relief in March. Finally, as a school staff group we are supportive of local charity 'Lisa's Gift' that exists to help Renfrewshire school pupils who need financial assistance to access aspects of school life. Last year a group of staff did the Kilt Walk for Lisa's Gift, and slightly less taxing was a recent Ladies Day at David Lloyd that saw many staff in attendance. Miss Brown, PT Nurture, has been heavily involved with this charity and is planning another Kilt Walk - please support this brilliant charity if you can.

Of special note, of course, must be the Sleep in the Park charity event that took place in December, in association with Social Bite. An intrepid bunch of S6 and staff, led by Mr Munro, braved the cold and wet to sleep rough for a night in Kelvingrove Park to raise funds and awareness of homelessness. The friends and families of JHS raised a massive £2000+. Thank you all so much.

the huge, real tree in the assembly hall (which gets a lot of attention from the S1!), to dances, positive behaviour reward events, the Christmas fayre (more about this below), charity work, school shows and the interhouse games, there is a buzz about the school and a warm sense of community spirit. It is also a

From Sleep in the Park, the S6 then went on to organise the Christmas parcel collection for the school and Johnstone was buzzing on the day when they hit the high street to deliver parcels to local elderly residents. We have received some lovely notes from local residents about this. The S6 also organised their first 'Snowball' Christmas dance in the Bowfield that was a brilliant night and a great practice for prom later in the year. The Christmas concert took place on the last week of term and showcased an increasingly large number of pupils' talents in singing, dancing and

In terms of sport, our young people continue to amaze us with their hard work, skills and talents in a range of sporting areas, both individual and team based. We have had representation at District and Scottish schools events, and some of our pupils are even competing at an international level. Well done to Katie who played China in a friendly Ice Hockey fixture and Leon who has been selected for Sarajevo 2019 for the Youth Olympics (Snowboarding).

A major focus for our school is career planning and options. We are really proud that 94% of our pupils leave to go to a positive, sustained post-school your child's school career.

At time of writing we have just finished prelims and DHTs and PTs are working together to look at how we continue to support our pupils in S4-6 to maximise their attainment. We will be hosting an academic review day for targetted S4-6 pupils in February when we will be inviting parents in to discuss next steps in their child's learning. We have also approached staff about delivering a programme of paid 'booster classes' (please note that this is separate to supported study drop-in sessions that are entirely at the goodwill of staff). We will be in touch with parents in due course a great success and raised funds for the school and the Parent Council grounds refurbishment. My thanks to all who supported this. We had a PC meeting on 19 November, and the next is scheduled for 25 February and we regularly update the school website with the minutes of these meetings.

In our bid to keep the communication lines as open as possible with parents, can I take this opportunity to remind you to make sure that we have the most up to date, valid contact details for you/your child and your designated emergency contacts such as grandparents, family friends etc. We realise that phone num-



bers and emails can change from time to time but please remember to update us on this, thank you.

Finally, you may have noticed at recent parent evenings that we have been giving you a copy of your child's attendance to correct and annotate. This is a measure we have taken to get as accurate a picture as possible and to convert any 'unauthorised' absences (i.e. no note received) into authorised ones. My thanks for your help and support with this.

School Improvement Agenda

In Johnstone High School, we are always reviewing what we do to see if we can improve outcomes for our pupils. Our new counselling service, Place2Be, is now in place and is beginning to embed with the pupils. Run by Maggie Payne, there are a limited number of places for youngsters who need regular, intensive support, alongside a more informal drop-in that all students can access out with class time. There are posters about Place2Be all around the school giving pupils the information they need.

I have become increasingly concerned over the past few months about the level of littering in and around the school building and local areas. As a school, we have supported the 'Team Up' campaign run by the council, however we are looking at ways we can develop this at school level. I am keen to organise a litter-picking programme with volunteer pupils, and will be in touch with parents in due course about this. Any ideas or suggestions from parents on this will be most gratefully welcomed.

We continue to be well supported by the local authority and we work closely with our link Education Manager, Maureen Sneddon. Maureen has recently been in school to discuss our attainment, and will be visiting us again in February/March about learning and teaching. This is a planned series of visits that take place in all schools across Renfrewshire.

In the month of November, the SMT and the Art department joined up to carry out a 'closer look' review of the department. Over the course of the week, a number of classroom visits took place, alongside pupil focus groups and professional dialogue sessions with each member of the Art team. The result was a very strong report highlighting the strengths of the department, alongside a small number of suggested areas to support the department moving forward. My thanks to all the staff and pupils who helped during this process.

Finally, my thanks to the parents who took the time to contribute to the survey put out by Brian Donnelly, the consultant the Renfrewshire Council have brought in to support schools further develop their anti-bullying policies and procedures. We have had a number of meetings with Brian who will be helping us bring our Respect for All policy in line with the local authority position. Your comments and suggestions, alongside a range of pupil focus groups, are vital in helping us get it right for our young people. Brian has also been in to school to offer behaviour management professional development

for teaching staff, with further inserts planned.

POST PRELIM PROCESS

Ms Cole explains the important next steps after this years prelims

n the 8th of January this year our senior pupils embarked on the beginning of their 2019 exam journey. Over 70 exams were sat over the prelim period and senior pupils conducted themselves brilliantly during this time. I would like to thank all of our teachers for planning, organising and assessing the prelim exams which give much needed exam practice and help us to ensure that all pupils are sitting qualifications at the correct levels. There is also a huge amount of work done by the support staff in school over the exam period which allows us to offer additional support to pupils wherever needed, many thanks for all your hard work.

The junior school were also very supportive of the senior pupils during the prelims and respected the areas that were out of bounds. This really helped the pupils sitting exams in the hall especially to concentrate- well done!

As ever we had a superb team of invigilators in school to supervise the exams and I would like to thank them all for their help and support, especially Mr Beattie, our chief invigilator, who puts in so many hours organising invigilators.

Post Prelim Process

Prelim results are being issued to pupils as quickly as possible and faculty heads/ principal teachers are meeting with depute head teachers to discuss pupil progress and proposed level changes. As a school we want all pupils to achieve their potential and so sometimes it is necessary to give pupils and parents a recommendation for a level change as outlined below:

Should a level change be recommended and agreed by the Depute Head teacher in charge of each house/year group then parents/ carers will be invited into a meeting during w/b 18/2/19 during which next steps will be discussed and agreed by all.

These meetings are important so parents get the opportunity to engage with us and get professional advice on the current course structure, i.e it is not necessary for pupils in S4/S5 to complete all qualifications in one year. **Booster Classes**There will be a programme of raising attainment booster classes running in school from the middle of February. Pupils have been given an opportunity to view all available classes and signup for these.

It is important that all pupils listen to their teacher's advice as to what classes to attend and they should ensure that they attend all classes that they have been individually invited to as there is a very specific programme of targeted support for different groups of pupils.

There will also be a programme of booster classes running during the first week of the Easter Holidays and this programme will be published during March. Pupil should again sign up for the appropriate sessions when advised to do so.

I would like to thank all the staff who already have and who will be giving up their free time to run these booster classes and for the huge amount of work involved in preparing them to ensure that all of our pupils achieve their potential.

hat a busy time Johnstone High pupils have had developing their employability skills! In a series of workshops aimed at developing skills for the world of work, we have welcomed our Partners at Morrisons Supermarket into the school to help some senior pupils in the art of CV writing and Interview techniques. Yvonne Frame and her team provided guidance, support and practical advice to boost the confidence of pupils in applying for higher education or employment. We have also welcomed Wilma Ledburn from Renfrewshire Council and Paula Leca from Developing the Young Workforce West into school. They have been assisting Winter Leavers with college applications and employment pathways. They will continue to support our pupils throughout the coming months.

January saw the Johnstone High Careers Event, which was attended by 21 companies and organisations, such as Rolls Royce, BAE Systems, J P Morgan, Future Textiles, West College Scotland, Spateston Nursery and Street League.

The purpose of the event was to help pupils with their career choices. Some pupils made contacts with employers to secure interviews and work experience opportunities.

Kenzie Thompson (S4) and Connor Hayes (S4) were selected to attend the Greenpower Initiative based at West College Scotland. Once a week these pupils work on building a race car. This experience requires both pupils to fund raise, approach employers and work as part of a team. We look forward to seeing the finished race car and wish both pupils success.

LISA'S GIFT

Lisa's gift is a small charitable organisation which has been created in memory of Lisa Moran.

Its principal purpose is to offer financial assistance to students attending Renfrewshire schools, who may require extra support to allow them to take part in the full range of school based and extra-curricular activities.

Since its inception in 2014 the charity has been able to help over 400 pupils in schools across Renfrewshire, including many of our own pupils, to participate in a wide range of activities. These have ranged from educational trips, both abroad and within the UK, to the provision of breakfast supplies, sports kit and warm clothing.

To support Lisa's Gift in the wonderful work that they do, staff at Johnstone High have taken part in a number of fundraising activities to raise money for Lisa's Gift.

In April last year, four members of staff took part in the Kiltwalk, a 23-mile walk from Glasgow to Balloch, raising over £3000. In November last year, a number of staff also attended Lisa's Gift Annual Ladies Afternoon Tea which raised over £3500. Plans are already underway for this year's Kiltwalk which will take place on Sunday 28th April. A number of staff and some of our senior pupils will take their uniform off, put their kilt on and walk the 23 miles from the starting line at Glasgow Green to the finish line at Balloch Park.
