We currently have a vacancy in music.

Mr Kennedy has joined the JHS staff on a permanent capacity as a teacher of ICT and is currently Acting PT Skye House. Ms Butler-Robson, PT Iona House, has returned from maternity leave 4 days per week, and Miss Mullaney has taken on the role of Acting PT Iona House for one day per week. Miss Mullaney provides cover on a Wednesday and has responsibility for S3 lona pupils.

I am also pleased to inform you that Mr Cameron, Classroom Assistant, was successful at interview and will take up the post of Inclusion Support Assistant later in the term. We have also appointed Mrs MacDonald, a former member of staff in our office, who will join us at the end of the month to take on the 'team leader' role.

Finally, congratulations to Mr Palombo who became a dad to baby Cora this term; and Mr Cameron who became a dad to baby Vincent.

Start of term

We started the school session with two staff in-service days. This allows staff to get prepared for the term ahead and to focus collegiate activity on our three school priorities of:

- 1. health and wellbeing
- 2. learning and teaching
- 3. raising attainment

Our in-service days in August included anti-bullying training delivered by Brian Donnelly (former head of RespectMe Scotland), and nurture training from Depute Principal Psychologist for Renfrewshire, Fiona Williams.

We also analysed school and department SQA results and focused on some key pupil successes, including the pupils who achieved straight A awards in National 5 and Highers. The new pupil session also began with assemblies where I outlined my expectations of them for the year ahead, introduced the



new Relationships Policy (more on this later in this newsletter) and emphasised the impotance the house group structure to make sure all members of the school community know who their key adults are:

I'm sure that most JHS parents know that we encourage parents getting in touch with the school, and the Pastoral Support PT should be your first point of contact.

The beginning of the term also saw a very successful programme of senior befriending. A large number of S6 pupils undertook the appropriate training and then S1 buddy duties for the first couple of weeks of term. The befrienders supported our new S1 to find their way about and also during class time. My thanks to Miss Wilkie for her lead role in this and all the S6 who carried out their duties so well.

All pupils should now be up and running with 'Show My Homework'. Mr Palombo has responsibility for this and any ongoing issues with SMH logins should be directed to Mr Palomo who will be happy to help. Parents report that SMH helps them to support their child to keep on top of homework and revision and I would thoroughtly recommend it to you.

Tempest photography have been in to take our S1 and S3 photographs and the pupils looked wonderful in their new uniforms.

The S1 were also very keen customers during our first 'fresher's fayre' event at the beginning of term. Organised by Miss MacPherson, this was a very successful signing up opportunity that involved staff and senior pupils setting up stalls to promote the wide range of extra-curricular activities that are available this session. We have a wide range of clubs and trips for all tastes and years and I would ask that all parents encourage their child to sign up for something (the collated offer will be published on the website/twitter feed very soon).

(If your child is interested in a trip / activity / club but cost is an issue, please contact your child's Pastoral teacher. We will try our best to financially support our pupils, and always in a sensitive manner. Similarly if any parent requires support with free meal / footwear and clothing grant forms – please get in touch and we will help.)

In terms of our parents, all parents should have received a fairly weighty data packet on the first week of term containing the calendar, school information and a number of forms to complete and return. My thanks to those who have returned the slips contained inside e.g. medical info, photo permission, religious observance etc. If you haven't received this, pleasr check your child's bag in th first instance and then contact our school office for another to go out. It is vitally important that we have the correct contact details for parents in case your child takes unwell at school.

Regarding the calendar, Mrs Cole, DHT, has created a schedule that breaks down when parents can expect tracking reports, report cards and a parents' evening from S1 through to S6. This is available on the website.

Pupil Leadership

The S4 and S5 Columba 1400 graduates put on a very successful 'values' themed week for the new S1 to introduce them to what our values mean in action. This was finished with a 'friendship disco' on the Friday afternoon. The S4/5 will continue to develop in their role as values ambassadors throughout the session and beyond.

The seniors have also had a productive start of session. We have new pupil leaders across all years; S5 (house captains) who lead on charity work; and our S6 badge holders. My congratulations to head girl, Erin Corner, head boy, Tom Reid and their team of deputes. The badge holders were selected by application form and a three panel interviews/tasks (one of which was a pupil group made up of our Columba 1400 graduates). The maturity, poise and commitment to our school values was outstanding. Well done to all pupils who applied for a leadership role; we are proud of you all.

Seniors

Senior timetables were finalised by the end of August, with a number of our pupils going to college courses at West College Scotland, or undertaking courses at other high schools through the Renfrewshire consortia.

A coach load of 55 seniors were taken by Mr Munro, Ms Wilkie and Mr Menzies to the SECC for the annual UCAS (university application) event. We also put on a Senior School Information Evening in early October with presentations and hand outs on study skills, SASS funding, UCAS, plagiarism and supporting your young person at home.

A number of S6 pupils undertook training in the 'mentors in violence prevention' programme, delivered by in-house trainers Mr Clark and Mrs Badger. These S6 will be going into S1 PSE classes to deliver lessons to their younger peers on pro-social behavior, tackling and handling bullying, and contributing to a school culture of empowerment, respect and support.

Selected S6 pupils went with Mrs Carlin (Employability Project Leader) to the Chamber of Commerce business engagement lunch, with keynote speakers from Morrisons Construction.

Finally, the seniors are busying themselves with service to the school community activities such as volunteering, sports leadership, charity work and S6 committees to organise prom, discos, the yearbook and hoodies. I am delighted that the seniors give so much back, however we emphasise that their number one priority is their studies and to that end we have been and will continue to maintain a position of 4 subjects in S6 unless the pupil has a full programme of advanced higher study. Research shows that 'busy' pupils are far more likely to be successful in S6 and beyond. My thanks to parents for their ongoing support with this.

Parents

Miss Docherty in HE continues as the Parents in Partnership project leader for session 2019/20. This involves working intensively with groups of S1 and S2 parents, alongside P7 parents as part of our primary transition programme. Families taking part in the project take part in a number of activities (subject tasters, family cooking with their child) and information sessions from partner agencies. Miss Dochherty also organises the school meal taster sessions for P7 parents and pupils at our P7 info evening each June - the last one was a huge success, attended by 300+ people. If any parent has ideas or suggestions around developing the Parents in Partnership programme please feel free to speak to either Miss Docherty, Mrs O'Malley DHT Pupil Support, or myself.

Mrs O'Malley and I have now completed our annual round of Primary School roadshow visits where we meet prospective S1 parents (current P7) and speak to them about life as part of the Johnstone High School community. These visits took place during September and are about to be rounded off with the P7 Open Night which will take place on 22nd October. My thanks in advance to Parent Council members supported us during these events, and whose children take part in helping showcase their skills and talents.

School Improvement Agenda

This session we have retained our two key priorities of health and wellbeing and learning and teaching and have added a third – raising attainment. These form the basis of our school improvement plan which can be viewed on the website, alongside our standards and qualities report for 2019/20. Of particular note is that, in line with national and local priorities, we have prioritised attainment in Maths and numeracy. We have dedicated an additional period in S4 for attainment. My thanks to the parents who fed back to us with school improvement suggestions following the parent council meeting in May.

Maureen Sneddon, our Education Manager will be in school on three (formal) occasions this session to oversee our work. Maureen came into school on the 13th of September to speak to myself and the staff about our progress in terms of 'leadership of change' and 'wellbeing, inclusion and equality'. Our next meeting on 'attainment' is scheduled for the 13th of November.

Finally, I will be out of school 28-31st October on inspection duties with Education Scotlan (HMIE). This is a great opportunity to see good practice in other establishments and ensure that JHS is outward looking as we continue on our improvement journey.

Updates on building improvement

Over the summer holidays we embarked on a refresh of our Assembly Hall. This involved decoration, new stage curtains, new paneling and lighting. My hope is for a new space that is warm and welcoming and sets an appropriately professional tone for pupils, parents and visitors to the school.

In order to maintain the Assembly Hall post-refurbishment, the decision has been taken to allow only S4-6 to use it at interval and lunchtime. S1-3 are being encouraged to use the canteen, coffee shop and the outdoor seating area (weather dependent). More seats have been put into the canteen to accommodate the juniors, and the sofas in the coffee shop moved out to the S6 common room in order to fit in more standard seating.

Over the summer we also moved Learning Support into the Library and vice versa. This means that the Library is now situated in the heart of the English department and that Learning Support has a large, well utilized space. LS are able to zone off areas for art therapy, paired reading, ASDAN, and it also has a reduced sensory area for learners with who require a quiet space.

The Art department have had new furniture in a couple of the classrooms.

As Place2Be finished up at JHS in June, we now have another meeting room available. Please note that Lifelink counselling will be offering a service to JHS pupils two days per week and we continue to utilise the services of our Home Link team and Miss Wilkie, PT Pastoral, who all have counselling qualifications and expertise.

The former RE classroom is in the process of being repurposd as an inclusion space, and the next door RE staff base is now our 'Reflection room', used as alternative to formal exclusion from school.

Pupil Behaviour in the School and Local Community

The vast majority of Johnstone High School pupils demonstrate our school values both at school and in their local community. I know that I can rely on most of our students to work hard and behave in class, to treat their community with respect, to be good citizens who think of and help others. My thanks to each of these pupils for doing what we ask of them, and I hope parents are enjoying receiving monthly texts home congratulating pupils who have followed our new Relationships Policy (safe / ready / respectful).

However, there are occasions when young people make poor choices which then results in poor behaviour in classrooms, lack of respect to other pupils or staff, or indeed, is 'anti-social' in the local community. In school, we deal with matters of indiscipline in accordance with our Relationships Policy and in keeping with Renfrewshire Council guidance.

We work hard to support young people to make good choices and take responsibility when things go wrong – important life lessons, I'm sure you will agree. It is important they learn the life skill of 'making things better' when a relationship with a fellow pupil or member of staff has been damaged by their actions and restorative approaches underpin our work.

In order to keep our school community a calm and orderly place for learning to happen, I am asking for parental support in the following ways. Please speak with your child to remind them about:

Appropriate use of mobile phones: only in 'green zones'.

Too many of our students are 'glued' to devices and headphones throughout the school day (I'm sure parents will recognise this one too!).

Respect towards staff in classes and corridors:

Doing as staff ask, following the one way system and being in the right place at the right time.

Going to the toilet at the appropriate time: Too many of our pupils are asking to the toilet straight after the morning bell, interval and lunchtime.

Correct uniform:

Pupils should collect a slip from the office if they are not in correct uniform and parents will receive a text message to alert them.

Arrive at school on time:

Each morning pupils who are late sign in with myself or the DHTs. Far too many pupils are coming in late as they have 'slept in' or haven't been organised to get out of the house on time. Again, this is another important life lesson that we all need in the world of work.

I would ask for parental support to get pupils into school for 8.50am which is when lessons start. Thank you.

Finally, I am concerned by complaints I am receiving from local neighbours. A small number of our pupils are leaving the campus at lunchtime and are dropping litter or engaging in anti-social behaviour around the Auchengreoch area (back path) or the local shops.

For many months we have been working alongside the Council's community safety team, the Team Up to Clean Up initiative (you may have seen photos from our community litter picks) and Community Police officers who are now maintaining more of a presence in the local area during school time. This is in addition to Mr Menzies DHT who is a visible presence in the local community at intervals and lunchtimes.

Again, this a plea for parental support in tackling this. As a school we are working with the Council catering team to make school lunches more appealing, and the Parent Council funded grounds project has made the playground a nicer environment to eat/relax – both are measures designed to help keep our pupils in the building and discourage them from going to the shops for an unhealthy lunch in a polystyrene container.



Pupil Attendance

ttendance at school is essential to ensure that all our pupils reach their full potential and maximise their attainment. If your child is absent from school for any reason then you must phone the school before 9.30am to inform us of the reason for their absence and they should also bring in a note to the school office on the first day of their return to school. If your child's attendance falls below an acceptable level you will receive attendance letters, phone calls from their pastoral care teacher and you may be invited into the school for a meeting to discuss your child's attendance and how we can work together to improve it.

Timekeeping is an important life skill which prepares our young people for the world of work. To improve timekeeping and keep you informed of your child's timekeeping there is a late book every morning where the reason for lateness and time of arrival are recorded. If your child is repeatedly late then you will be contacted by your child's pastoral care teacher who may put them on a timekeeping card and if this does not improve the timekeeping you will be invited to school for a meeting to discuss how we can work together to improve their timekeeping. If a pupil is 10 minutes late each day this is the equivalent of missing a full lesson each week.

SQA Attainment

Ms Cole

spoke to you in the summer about how proud we were of all the efforts that our senior pupils made during the SQA exam diet to achieve the best possible results. We were delighted with the achievement of our pupils in a number of subject areas and the progress that many pupils made from the prelim exams to the final exams. Of exceptional note are the 7 pupils that achieved 7 A grades in their national 5 exams and the 8 pupils that achieved 6 A grades in their National 5 exams. At Higher more pupils than in the previous 3 years achieved 5 A-C grades in their higher exams with 3 pupils achieving 5 A grades and 8 pupils achieving 4 A grades. Fantastic achievements!

Outstanding National 5 results were seen in a number of departments where the percentage of pupils achieving an A-C pass was very high-PE (99%), Art (92%), Spanish (100%) and German (100%). Very strong performances were also seen in English, Woodwork, Fashion, Practical Cookery and Music Technology.

At Higher there were also a number of excellent results with the PE, French, Art, Admin and IT, Music, Spanish and Physics all performing verily strongly.

We continue to be delighted by the exceptional progress that the school is making in literacy with more S4 pupils achieving a level 5 in Literacy by the end of S4 this year than in previous years.

2019-2020

Whilst it may feel these exams are only just finished it is already time to start thinking about the year ahead. Our Prelim exam diet commences on Friday 29th November until Wednesday 18th December. This is a new time of year for our prelims which normally take place after the winter break. However, there is now more pressure on schools to make earlier decisions about what level of exams pupils will sit in the final exams and so it is necessary to gather evidence sooner so that our decisions can be made with the most information possible.

The prelim timetable will be issued w/c 28th October. I have tried to reduce the number of exams which clash to an absolute minimum, however there may be some pupils for whom a slightly altered timetable will be needed to accommodate all their option exams. Pupils should come and see me before prelims start so we can arrange another date for clashing exams.

Accompanying the prelim timetable will be the JHS Prelim Exam Guide. This document outlines the content that each subject will cover in the prelim exam along with helpful hints and tips as well as advice on where pupils can seek extra help and advice if needed.

You will also have seen the controlled assessment and coursework calendar which has been published on the website and has been issued to all senior pupils. This will help you support your young person in their time planning which we hope will reduce their stress levels and allow them to complete all assessments to the best of their ability.

Exams are no doubt a stressful experience for many pupils, pastoral teachers should be made aware of any anxiety/mental health issues which may impact on exam performance as soon as possible so that appropriate supports can be put in place to minimise any distress the young person may feel on exam days. I would also ask all parents and carers to please be aware of times/dates of exams and to be vigilant in making sure that their young person is on time for their exam (ideally arriving 20 mins BEFORE exam start time). Please also have frequent conversations about how much revision/ practice is taking place in the lead up to exams. Pupils should be revising throughout the year, not trying to cram information over a couple of weeks.

Many of our young people, especially those sitting National 5 exams in 5th year (and particularly those re-sitting N5s) need to be proactive in approaching teachers for help and support. I would expect to see all pupils attending supported study sessions wherever available and whenever possible but this is particularly important for pupils who take longer to grasp the subject knowledge required at N5/Higher level.

t has been a busy start to the school year for our Active Schools Team of Amy Couttie and Jamie Forrest, who have settled in well. As well as working with several primary schools in the Johnstone Cluster, Amy and Jamie have had lots going on in Johnstone High so far.

The selection of the Young Ambassadors was one of the first things to complete, and after a tough interview process, Rebecca Adams and Harry Orr were successful. A Young Ambassador has key roles in promoting sport and motivating and inspiring other young people to get involved in sport in a wide range of settings within their local communities, including schools, clubs and community organisations to influence numerous key aspects of school sport. They have already had their first taste of representing the school by opening the Primary Schools Netball League that took place in Johnstone High at the start of October. Other things the YA's will do include the formation of a School Sports Council. This council will have a significant say on sporting aspects within school.

My Future Pathway – Construction

Pupils will experience industry based learning opportunities such as taster days, employability workshops, site visits and CSCS card testing (required certification to get on a construction site). Upon successful completion of the programme, pupils will receive a 5-year labouring CSCS card, SVQ Level 1 Health and Safety in Construction Environment and will be put forward for on-site work placements with a local construction company. This opportunity will equip our pupils with the skills they need to enter the Construction Industry on

leaving school, and provide highly motivated individuals to the local economy. This pathway has proved successful for past pupil Liam Mc-Namee, who was invited to speak to interested pupils about his journey. Liam has secured an Modern Apprenticeship with Engie Construction after successful completion of last year's cohort of My Future Pathway.

FOOTBALL

The U16's have made a solid start to their campaign. They drew 0-0 with Clydeview Academy in difficult conditions, in what turned out to be an extremely tough battle. They then travelled to Erskine and defeated Park Mains 2-1 thanks to a brace from Allan McCrorie. The boys have been a credit to themselves so far and are looking to build on their positive start after the October break.

The U18's have made a disappointing start to their campaign. They lost their opening league game 3-1 away to St Ninians a game that they led for the majority. In the Scottish Cup vs. Hyndland, the boys threw away a 3-goal advantage to eventually lose on penalties. There have been definite positives in both performances, and the boys are hopeful for success in the league campaign.

RELATIONSHIP POLICY UPDATE

t the start of this term, our new Relationship Policy was launched. Replacing our Promoting Positive Behaviour, our Relationship Policy has a clear focus on improving relationships and embedding Nurturing approaches across the school. The policy was developed by a working group of staff over the last year, with contributions from learners through learner focus groups.

Here are some of the key features of the new policy:

Code of Conduct:

A "Code of Conduct" has been introduced with three key concepts: 'Safe', 'Ready' and 'Respectful'. All learners and staff are expected to be 'Safe in our behaviour', 'Ready to learn' and 'Respectful of everyone'. Learners have identified what being 'Safe', 'Ready' and 'Respectful' looks like in Johnstone High and these concepts are now displayed across the school and referred to in conversations around conduct.

Mobile phone zones:

Designated 'Green Zones' (where mobile phones can be used) and 'Red Zones' (where mobile phones cannot be used) have been introduced across the school. Signs are displayed in classrooms and across the school highlighting these zones. **Meet and greet:** The Head Teacher and staff volunteers now "Meet and Greet" learners at the main entrances into school in the morning. This is ensuring a welcoming and orderly entry to the school, while helping to build positive relationships with learners. In addition, learners are also greeted at their classroom doors by their teachers. Staff and pupil feedback on the introduction of the Meet and Greet has been overwhelmingly positive.

Uniform: The policy has a clear focus on all pupils wearing appropriate uniform every day. To support with this we have introduced a system where learners without appropriate school uniform are asked to collect a slip from the school office at the start of Period 1. This slip is then presented to teachers at the start of each period throughout the day. Information on learners who present without appropriate uniform is recorded by office staff, a text message is sent home and the information is passed on to the Pastoral Team.

Restorative approach: It is widely recognised that restorative approaches offer a powerful approach to promoting positive relationships and can lead to the successful resolution of any conflict. Restorative approaches permeate throughout the policy, key principles of restoratives approaches have been introduced and in September all staff attended a Restorative Approaches training session.

Celebrating appropriate behaviour:

We have refreshed our approaches and resources to celebrate appropriate behaviour across the school. At the end of every month, learners who receive no more than one demerit throughout that month receive a recognising positive behaviour text home. So far, more than 900 learners have received this text message each month. In addition, learners who receive no more than three demerits per term will also achieve a recognising positive behaviour certificate. To recognise excellent attendance, text messages will also be sent home at the end of each term to the parents and carers of learners who have more than 97% attendance.

Next steps

The policy will continue to be implemented throughout the next term. This will involve further staff training and staff focus groups to discuss strengths of the policy and areas to continue to develop. Learners will also be involved in learner focus groups to discuss their thoughts on the implementation of the policy since it's introduction.

ART DEPARTMENT NEWS

Ryan Hughes, a former pupil and now a graduate from Glasgow School of Art's Fashion and Textile course delivered a presentation about his work and experiences throughout his undergraduate training and since leaving art school. The pupils were keen to see and hear about real-world applications for the skills they have been taught in secondary school. They enjoyed seeing Ryan's work which included design concepts for fashion collections, leather samples and sketchbooks.

The Advanced Higher class were recently visited by Lisa McGovern from City of Glasgow College Faculty of Design. Lisa came to the school to talk to the pupils about the courses they have to offer within the faculty and brought samples of student work from the jewellery design course. The pupils were very grateful for her input and as a department we intend to build stronger links with the college. We hope to have Photography students from CoGC working with both our Higher and NPA classes in the near future.

YOUNG ENTERPRISE

Young Enterprise is back at Johnstone High and an enthusiastic group of S6s are ready to take the business world by storm. With the recent global focus on reducing plastic consumption in mind this year's team have spotted a gap in the market and are exploring products made from bamboo instead of plastic. Bamboo is much more eco-friendly and they are currently exploring the various products they could sell made from this material.

The team ran a coffee morning for staff in the school on the October in-service day and have successfully raised over £170 which is their much needed start-up capital to launch their business. We want to take this opportunity to thank all the staff for their support in helping us raise an amazing amount of money to kick start our business adventure. No doubt you will be seeing our budding entrepreneurs promoting their business further in the future and look out for more information about our upcoming product range.

Primary Transition



Making the adjustments to all the changes and challenges they face with enthusiasm and determination.

ur Primary Transition Teachers, Mrs Haining and Miss Cameron have been working with our current S1s since January. As part of the Attainment Challenge they are working towards closing the poverty related attainment gap and collaborating with primary and secondary teachers to support curricular transition. They have been working with case study pupils on a weekly basis, supporting them in their literacy and numeracy. The S1s have settled well into life at Johnstone High, making the adjustments to all the changes and challenges they face with enthusiasm and determination.

Maths and Numeracy

As part of Maths Week, we invited all our cluster primary 7 classes along to the high school to take part in a maths transition event. The primary 7's worked with pupils from other schools, allowing them to get to know their future classmates. With the help of some seniors they shared strategies, discussed number problems and showed the creative side of maths.

English and Literacy

The pupils in S1 have continued their learning in literacy through the Renfrewshire Literacy Approach that they are familiar with from primary school, i.e. Dive into Reading and Dive into Writing. This involves low stake writing opportunities and a reader response to the short story, 'The Great McGunnigle' that was started in primary and continued into high school. Using the skills they developed in primary and building on these within the English department, they have written their first critical essay.

Parental Engagement

Throughout the time they were based in the cluster primary schools, Miss Cameron and Mrs Haining met with several parents in order to ease their anxieties around their young person making the move to high school. This support then continued with Ms Docherty in the Parents in Partnership programme. This parental support has continued through a series of homework support sessions for maths, which has now been offered to all S1 families.











SPOTLIGHT ON NURTURE

Spotlight on Nurture

Nurture Group Activities

All of our Nurture groups started the year filling a page of their group's scrapbook with targets to achieve, both in the Thrive Hive and across the school, as well as planning fun things to do for the school year ahead. Targets ranged from subject specific targets, to joining new sports clubs to, to having more confidence, to achieving a positive behaviour certificate at the end of each term. Fun things to do ranged from going on trips out, to having a Halloween party, to organising a charity event, to helping out with the school's Christmas Fayre. Our groups are looking forward to filling their scrapbooks with photographs of them achieving their targets and doing their fun plans throughout the year.

Here are just some of the activities that our Nurture groups have been doing since the beginning of term.

> S1 Core group – Our S1 Core

group have been learning about the 'Zones of Regulation'. This is a conceptual framework used to teach self-regulation and self-control. The group categorised different thoughts, feelings and emotions into each zone and learned about strategies that can help when we are in each zone. The group put their learning into Zones of Regulation posters and these will soon be displayed in the Thrive Hive.

Our S1 Core group have also been developing their perseverance skills and their patience all while having fun through KAPLA. They have also been developing their organisational skills and attention to detail through baking delicious treats.

S2 Core group – Our S2 Core group have been taking part in a variety of different Art therapy activities. One of the activities was to use music to create Art, where the task was simple to listen to music and to paint to respond to the music. The atmosphere was tranquil and the finished pieces were simply beautiful.

The group have also been developing their social and emotional, cooperative and cognitive skills as well as their concentration

skills

through the Art and Craft of paper mache. They are looking brilliant and finished pieces will be displayed in the Thrive Hive next month.

S3 Core group – Our S3 Core group started off the year learning about adolescent brain development. They learned about how the brain works, the different parts of the brain and the functions of each part. They paid particular focus to the amygdala and how this part of the brain is associated with emotions, impulses and behaviours. Fascinating.

The S3 Core group have also been busy preparing for the Christmas Shoebox appeal, which they plan to lead this year with the help and support of staff and S1 pupils. This is a nationwide appeal to provide Christmas gifts to children and families in need. This appeal will be a big focus for the group throughout the month of October and will include a staff coffee morning and Krispy Kreme donut sale.

Variant group – Our Variant group have also been developing their skills through KAPLA, through Arts and Crafts and through baking. They have also managed to fit in a trip out to Subway for a breakfast treat.



Nurture Nairn

Since the beginning of term, we have been delighted to begin working with a golden Labrador Therapet, Nairn accompanied with his owner John. Nairn now spends every Thursday afternoon in the Calm Room and he is quickly becoming a firm favourite with pupils. Throughout Period 6, Nairn relaxes with a small reading group of S1 + S2 pupils. The group are currently reading David Williams' 'Demon Dentist'. The effect of Nairn on the pupils' confidence to read out loud has been amazing.

Nairn stays in the Calm Room Period 7 to help with our: 'End and Send'. This is a flexible session where each week different pupils get the opportunity to spend some time relaxing with Nairn at the end of the school day before going home. The effect of this has also been amazing and we are excited for more pupils to get a send-off with Nairn in the coming weeks.

Thrive Hive fish

Due to popular demand, we have welcomed more fish into the Thrive Hive. A group of pupils went out to the local pet shop and returned with two new Fantail Goldfish. The fish have been named Reggae and Gareth. Rumour has it a Silver Shark will be next to join us ... to be continued.

Recognition board

This session we have introduced a 'Compliments and Achievements' recognition board to the Thrive Hive to complement our pupils when they go 'above and beyond' in the Thrive Hive and to celebrate their achievements both in and out of school. So far, additions to the board include a number of praise postcards awarded to pupils from subjects across the school; a 'Man of the match' award, and an 'Excellent fairness when playing Uno' award.

Compliments and Achievements

Well done to Gemma McElwee (S3) who spent some time this month helping out in a local nursery. Gemma spent time playing with the children while learning about the job she hopes to do in the future. Staff commented that Gemma was kind, caring and simply wonderful with the children and that she will make a fabulous Nursery teacher in the future.



Well done to Jay Garrity (S2) who almost beat Mr. Munro at 'Who wants to be a Chocolate-aire?' Jay's exceptionally strong knowl-

Whole School Approach to Nurture

Nurture Core Group – Our Nurture Core Group is now represented by every department in the school. This session the group will roll out an action plan to continue to embed Nurturing approaches across the school.

Since the beginning of term the group have completed a Nurturing Approaches audit in their departments. Responses to this audit have been excellent and highlight the good Nurturing practice that is going on across the school. Examples of Nurturing approaches that staff have identified going on across the school include: promotion of positive relationships; consistency in language used within departments; knowing all pupils and their needs; differentiated approaches in the classroom; no raised voices; reflecting on needs underlying behaviours ... and much more. The group are currently collating the information into a Whole school Nurturing approaches handout and this will be distributed to all staff at the first TLC Twilight event.

The group have also fed back their thoughts and experiences of the introduction of 'Meet and Greet' as part of the new Relationship Policy. Feedback from the group on 'Meet and Greet' has been overwhelmingly positive with comments including: 'It gets the class of to a good, calm start'; it lets them know that I know them all as individuals': 'I think that a watchful eye in the corridor makes some pupils feel happier at change of periods'; 'pupils know that they are entering an environment where the teacher is happy to see them and this immediately

edge and competence that link together to show how 'emotion works'. The links between the different cog categories demonstrate the casual connections between concepts such as emotion triggers, body sensations, emotion behaviours, intensity and regulation strategies.

Nurture Outreach will also include the delivery of Mindfulness programmes to targeted groups of pupils. We also hope that through time Mindfulness sessions and activities will also be available to staff.

Nurture Outreach – Nurture Outreach will begin after the October holidays and will extend the Nurture support in the school.

Nurture Outreach will include the delivery of Emotion Works – an educational programme for emotional learning and literacy – to all S1 pupils. Based around a visually supportive framework for learning and talking about emotions, the goal of Emotion Works is to build emotional language and understanding in our pupils to help them to develop emotional competence and resilience.

The 'Cog Model' framework of Emotion Works identifies seven categories of emotional knowl-
