Welcome to the first Johnstone High School newsletter of session 2020/21. Our aim is to produce an entertaining and informative school newsletter once per term and these are sent electronically to parents via the text messaging system, through our website and twitter feed.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all parents and carers. It has been the most difficult time we have ever experienced in our school and we could not have made it through the past few weeks without the overwhelming support of everyone in our community. We have restrictive measures in school to keep everyone safe and we have made tough decisions. Most significantly, as all parents know, Johnstone High School has been subject to NHS test and protect on more than one occasion and this resulted in large numbers of pupils and their families (and some staff) self-isolating at home. September was very challenging, but we now know how resilient and tough we are and that we will cope with whatever Covid brings.

Life in school is very different from previous years. Covid restrictions impact on everything that we do, and the health and safety of your child and my staff is the number one priority. I pleased to report that we are all learning to live with the 'new normal', and the resilience and positivity of the young people never fails to amaze me. They are an absolute credit to their families and their school. As we know, being a teenager is tough, and none of us had to be teenagers during a pandemic. I am so proud of them and how they are getting on with it.

#### 1. Termly update a.Staffing

#### b. Start of term

School staff worked in the building from June onwards to make sure the school was fully prepared for pupils returning in August. As you know, the Scottish government brought schools back early (10th August) and we had our usual two in-service days. This was spent getting classrooms ready and looking at Covid secure learning and teaching.

We also reviewed our SQA results, another key part of school life dramatically different in 2020 compared with previous years. This year's SQA process was challenging for us all, and in early August we had to react to the SQA and government changing the position on how final grades were generated. My thanks to all pupils, parents and school staff for their hard work and support throughout this time.

The new pupil session also began with virtual, in-class based lesson/assemblies where I outlined my expectations of them for this unique year ahead. I also emphasised the importance the house group structure to make sure every pupil knows who their key adults are:

Skye S1-5 Mrs O'Malley DHT Mr Kennedy PT I'm sure that most JHS parents know that we encourage parents getting in touch with the school, and the Pastoral Support PT should be your first point of contact.

All pupils should now be up and running with 'Show My Homework'. **Miss Wilson** and Mrs O'Malley have responsibility for this and any ongoing issues with SMHW logins should be directed to them. Parents report that SMHW helps them to support their child to keep on top of homework and revision and was invaluable during lockdown.

In terms of our parents, all parents should have received a weighty data packet on the first week of term containing school information and several forms to complete and return. My thanks to those who have returned the slips contained inside e.g. medical info, photo permission, religious observance etc. If you haven't received this, please check your child's bag in the first instance and then contact our school office for another to go out. It is vitally important that we have the correct contact details for parents in case your child takes unwell at school. This is particularly important in the current circumstances – if a pupil has Covid symptoms we need to get in contact with you straight away. Similarly, if your family needs to be contacted through the test and protect process we need your accurate numbers and address.

Finally, I had a virtual Parent Council meeting in early September. My thanks to Diane Spence who has this year stepped down as the Chair. Diane was a fabulous friend and supporter of the school and her legacy will be felt for years to come – not least the grounds project which provided essential seating and an outdoor classroom which were used extensively by pupils of all ages over the autumn term.

Jean McFarlane has now taken over as the Chair and I look forward to working with Jean over the next few months and years. Details about joining the Parent Council were included in your parent pack. The next meeting – virtual again, I'm afraid – will be the 16th November in the early evening.

c. Pupil Leadership My congratulations to captains Lucy Dempster and Alexander Brown and their team of depute and vice captains who were all recently appointed. The S6 badge holders were selected by application form, assessment center which includes a pupil panel, and a formal interview (it's not unlike the Apprentice!). The maturity, poise and commitment to our school values was outstanding. Well done to all pupils who applied for a leadership role; we are proud of you all.

We will hear more from them later in this newsletter.

#### d.Seniors

The beginning of the term saw a Covid secure version of senior befriending take place. Many S6 pupils undertook the appropriate training and then carried out S1 buddy duties for the first couple of weeks of term. This was especially important this year as the S1 had not been in school over the summer months because the three-day visit had been cancelled. The befrienders supported our new S1 to find their way about and during class time, break and lunchtime. My thanks to Miss Wilkie for her lead role in this and all the S6 who carried out their duties so well (future teachers were clearly obvious...as well as those who now know that it is not the profession for them!).

Senior timetables were finalised by the end of August, with several our S6 pupils going to college courses at West College Scotland or undertaking courses at other high schools through the Renfrewshire consortia. We have tried hard to minimise external travel due to Covid and as a result have many advanced highers taking place in JHS this session.

Our Senior School Information Evening will take place virtually on 18th November this year; a presentation with audio recording. This will cover topics such as study skills, SASS funding, UCAS, plagiarism, mental health (mindful of Covid) and supporting your young person at home. Parents will receive a text when this is ready to view on our website.

Mrs Carlin (Employability Project Leader) continues to engage with Renfrewshire Council, the chamber of commerce and local businesses in order to find opportunities for training, employment and apprenticeships. She regularly posts these on our twitter page – please follow us for more info.

#### 2.Health and Safety

I understand that parents and carers, rightly, have anxieties about sending their child to school during the pandemic. I also know that this was not made better by the fact that our school was one of the first to undergo test and protect. This was very challenging

because at that point, the rule was that ENTIRE families had to self-isolate. I also know that parents would have liked more information about who had tested positive, however schools (like any workplace) are bound be very strict rules about confidentiality. My apologies if you felt you would have liked more detail; our communications were directed by both Renfrewshire Council and Greater Glasgow and Clyde Public Health teams.

We had a pre-arranged meeting with the chief inspector of the Health and Safety Executive when we were in the middle of test and protect. **Our** school passed with ZERO recommendations as we had implemented all government and authority health and safety guidance. I hope this helps give you the reassurance that our school takes Covid extremely seriously.

We have put in place a raft of mitigation measures to keep everyone as safe as we can. I will list these in a moment, and if you would like any more details, please ask your child as they can tell you how this operates day to day. If you would like more information, every letter that I sent you (or that Director Steven Quinn sent you) is on our school website. We have also given the pupils several health and safety briefings as it is really important they understand why we have these rules as they are much more likely to follow them that way!

- 1. If your child has symptoms they must not be sent to school. Please err on the side of caution and get a test.
- 2. If a pupil reports having any Covid symptoms in school, we will securely isolate them until you can come to collect them. If your child tells us they have a new continuous cough, a temperature or a loss of taste/smell then we cannot have them back until there is a negative test.

- 3. Pupils enter in the morning, after break and after lunch via their dedicated year group door. They are greeted by teams of staff each time, all hands are sanitised and all masks are on.
- One-way system so people aren't walking past each other, face-toface.
- 5. Face coverings are worn in corridors and in communal places
- There are cleaning caddies and cloths in each class – pupils wipe down their desks
- Windows and doors, where possible, as open to allow ventilation. Pupils will be allowed to wear outdoor clothing in class if this proves challenging in the winter.
- 8. Pupils bring their own materials. Bags never go on desks.
- Teachers stay in their own safe teaching space at the front, 2m away from pupils (all departments have at least one 2m stick to judge safe distance)
- 10. Teachers no longer circulate the class. They are using different techniques now, such as 'feedback tables' and visualisers for science demos
- 11. Classroom assistants have been extracting pupils to offer them help as they cannot safely do that in the classroom environment.
- 12. Pupils stay in the same seats, in rows, facing the front to reduce face-to-face contact
- We have seating plans for every class in case we need to identify close contacts
- S1-2 classes are staying in their class bubble as much as possible, therefore no 'setting' in classes such as Maths, or gender only classes (PE)
- 15. We no longer have a common room. S6 report to the study hall when they have a study period. They either stay there in a set seat or go to a teacher's classroom to study.
- We have introduced a trial of staggered breaks and lunchtimes to allow S1-3 and S4-6 to stay in-

side in either the canteen or hall. This also separates BGE and Senior Phase 'bubbles'.

- Senior staff are monitoring the bus bay and pupil pick up every day. We are also handing out face coverings before pupils go on school contract buses.
- 18. PE has been outside, following government guidance. The weather in September was favourable, not so much in October. This has been hard as the pupils have got wet when the rain has come on during PE lessons.
- Music, Science, Technical, Home Economics, Art – practical subjects have reduced and then adapted their hands-on activity to ensure touch surfaces have remained Covid secure. They continue to follow government guidance in their areas.
- 20. Visitors / parents coming into the school – we have only been able to welcome adults in who have an appointment. This is following government and council guidance.
- 21. Clubs and activities (trips etc.) have all been impacted. As have school events (we can't have large gatherings – so no assemblies, concerts or parents' evenings). We hope to get these back as soon as it is safe to do so.
- 22. Pupils have had briefing lessons whenever there is a change to the rules.

#### \*\*\*\*STOP PRESS: TIER THREE CHANGES AS OF MONDAY 2nd NOVEMBER\*\*\*\*

On Friday 30 November the government announced that schools would be subject to additional measures in tier three areas, which includes Renfrewshire.

For us, this means:

- All teachers wear face coverings
   in classrooms
- All senior phase (S4-6) pupils are to wear face coverings in classrooms

- PE guidance has changed, and pupils can now do some PE activity indoors
- Face coverings should be worn by parents and other visitors to any school site (whether entering the building or otherwise), including parents at drop-off and pick-up

#### 3. School Improvement Agenda

In this unique school year, the biggest priority for us is the health and safety of the children and the staff, which you can see above.

Then it is about making sure they receive a quality experience when they are here. This breaks down into three priority areas, which feature on our school improvement plan for 2020/21

- Health and wellbeing with a focus
   on pupil mental health
- Learning and teaching
- Raising attainment

In our school we have put in place six 'recovery working groups'. All teachers are a member of one of these, so we are all sharing the responsibility for our recovery. All the actions the groups are taking forward is about Covid:

- 1. Health and safety
- 2. Learning and teaching in a Covid secure classroom, or digitally, if we go into lockdown again
- 3. Pupil mental health and wellbeing
- 4. Relationships policy how do we make sure everyone in school is safe, ready and respectful in the current climate?
- 5. Curriculum how do we ensure that pupils in the BGE catch up any gaps in learning?
- SQA and assessment ensuring we are ready for the SQA / government position e.g. no N5 exam, teacher estimates etc.

Maureen Sneddon, our Education Manager will virtually engage with the school on several formal occasions this session to oversee our work. Our next meeting on 'attainment' is scheduled for the 8th of December.

#### 4. The calendar and parents' evenings

We had our school calendar ready to go in October, however the DFM John Swinney then came out with changes to the SQA diet for 2021. This meant that we had to revise the calendar, and each time we do it has to go back to the teacher unions for ratification.

I am pleased to let you know that the calendar is now ready and my apologies for the delay. We will have this with you electronically as soon as possible, and the A4 card for your fridge is currently at the printers – we will give it to the pupils to bring home when they are ready, and will text to let you know to check the bag.

Key points this session:

- We have not scheduled any events prior to Christmas. As we enter tier three measures this seems to have been a sensible move.
- We have provisional school events in the calendar for Spring / Summer 2021. If we can't go ahead in person, we will attempt a virtual version.
- Parents' evenings cannot go ahead in person this session. There is simply no safe way to have around 200 adults come into school over a 2-hour period.
- We have liaised with Renfrewshire Council and the other 10 high schools and we have agreed to offer an additional report card to parents in place of the traditional parent's evening. We had concerned that our IT capacity was not enough to move over to virtual appointments (teachers would have had 20-30 virtual appointments each and our connectivity would not have been able to sustain this).
- This means that for each year group in JHS parents and carers can expect a tracking report and two report cards.

(If you have any worries about your child's progress, please contact the Pastoral Support teacher.)

This year our calendar is therefore lighter than usual. As soon as we can safely do so we will have clubs, trips and events back up and running. In their absence we are doing what we can to make school life fun. Please check our twitter feed for Halloween doors; many teachers, with the help of their classes, decorated their classroom door and we raised £40 for the foodbank.

We also have a Christmas committee and hope to do a range of activities to make December as special as possible. Sadly, we can't put on our interhouse games, Christmas Concert or Parent Council Fayre as these are 'large gatherings'. Although prelims will be taking place for seniors, I'm sure they will still enjoy their Christmas dinner, Christmas jumper day and all the other Covid safe activities the Christmas team can come up with.

#### 5. What to do if your child is self-isolating

If you are contacted by NHS test and protect to tell you that your child is self-isolating, it is important that the family follows the advice given. If the contact happened in school, we will also send a letter to you on their behalf. This will tell you the last day of self-isolation and when your child can return to school.

Getting contacted in this way can be upsetting and very disruptive to family life. One of the many considerations you will have as a parent is about the gap in your child's learning. When the school was subject to test and protect, we were one of the first schools in Scotland to be impacted, and we also had a number of staff off who were either ill, close contacts themselves, or who had a child who was a contact. In other words, we were under a great deal of pressure. All staff are now back at work and have been for some time. We now have a three layer approach to supporting pupils who are self-isolating:

- Ask your child to login to show my homework (S1-3) or Microsoft teams (S4-6). The teachers have placed materials on there, although they are not putting full lessons on as they cannot teach in person all day and fully support a digital offer at the same time.
- 2. We have a Johnstone High remote learning website that has lots of materials on it across a range of subjects.
- 3. There is now a Renfrewshire remote learning website. Subject specialists across the 11 high schools have placed materials on here, and twice a week each subject will have a Renfrewshire teacher run a 'surgery' where pupils can ask questions or get help. Mr Glen (Physics) and Mrs Campbell (French) from JHS are helping out along with several other Renfrewshire teachers.

The links you need have already been text out to you by the school. These sites can also be found on our main website. If you have any problems, please phone and we will help (if your child has forgotten their team code, the office staff have the entire list of codes for every class in the senior phase!).

Finally, it is important that if your child is self-isolating they stay in a routine and check in to their subjects every day. It goes without saying that they must also stay at home and obey their self-isolation. Pupils who are self-isolating MUST NOT 'visit' the school at break or lunchtime. Parents and public health will be contacted. Thanks for your support with this.

#### 6. A plea for your help

I hope you can tell from the details above that the staff are currently working very hard to keep the school safe and give your child the best possible educational experience.

There are a few things we would appreciate your help and support with. I know this doesn't apply to all pupils or families, but would appreciate parents having a chat at home about: 1. Please speak to your child about face coverings:

a. Bringing their own covering to school everyday

b. Wearing it properly at the appropriate times. Staff will challenge young people every time they don't have it on, or it is resting on their chin. We don't want to endanger our good relationships with pupils by being constantly on at them.

2. If your child goes to the local shops, remind them to wear their face covering and follow the rules that apply to all members of the public, like social distancing

3. Parents who collect by car – the buses are struggling to get into the bays and when they get stuck it is gridlock. Not good for health and safety or drivers' blood pressure! Please park in the hub car park, thank you.

#### 4. Litter.

It's really disappointing to see our grounds and local areas suffer from litter being left. We reinforce this in school but would appreciate you reinforcing this at home too.

Most Johnstone High School pupils demonstrate our school values both at school and in their local community. I know that I can rely on most of our students to work hard and behave in class, to treat their community with respect, to be good citizens who think of and help others. My thanks to each of these pupils for doing what we ask of them, and I hope parents are enjoying receiving monthly texts home congratulating pupils who have followed our Relationships Policy (safe / ready / respectful).

Here is a reminder of some key points in the Relationships Policy:

1. Appropriate use of mobile phones: only in 'green zones'.

Too many of our students are 'glued' to devices and headphones throughout the school day (I'm sure parents will recognise this one too!).

2. Respect towards staff in classes and corridors:

Doing as staff ask, following the oneway system and being in the right place at the right time. 3. Going to the toilet at the appropriate time:

Too many of our pupils are asking to the toilet straight after the morning bell, interval and lunchtime.

4. Correct uniform:

Pupils should collect a slip from the office if they are not in correct uniform and parents will receive a text message to alert them.

5. Arrive at school on time:

Each morning pupils who are late sign in with me or the DHTs. Far too many pupils are coming in late as they have 'slept in' or haven't been organised to get out of the house on time. Again, this is another important life lesson that we all need in the world of work.

I would ask for parental support to get pupils into school for 8.50am which is when lessons start.

## SQA Update Ms Cole

t is hard to believe that we are now in November and have started the process of entering pupils for SQA courses this year. I would like to review the 2019-2020 exam diet then explain what will be happening with national courses this year as there has been a considerable amount of change as a result of COVID restrictions.

#### Exam Diet 2020

Many of you will be aware that just before lockdown in March the DFM announced the cancellation of the exam diet for all National 5 and Higher candidates. This came as a shock and disappointment to everyone who had worked towards exams and those that had supported them throughout the year. The result of this decision was that as a school we had to review the evidence we had collected for each candidate throughout the year and then, using SQA direction and Renfrewshire guidance alongside a very extensive internal moderation process, final teacher estimates were submitted to SQA in May last year.

When results were delivered in August it was clear that many teacher estimates had been downgraded by the SQA. Over the summer holidays we then prepared policies and procedures for a new appeals process and collated all candidate evidence for review so that we could submit appeals for downgraded pupils and we had already had pupils in to sign consent forms. It was the day before the new term started when the DFM announced that all pupils would be awarded their final teacher estimates submitted in May and that the appeals process would then not take place as originally planned. Whilst this decision was welcomed, and we were delighted that pupils in many cases received a higher award then originally issued by SQA, it did mean several late option changes for many pupils.

#### Exam Diet 2021

The DFM recently announced that a full **Higher exam diet is planned for 2021 (13th May – 4th June 2021)** However, it was also announced that National 5 Exams would not take place and that final grades would again be based on teacher estimates and coursework (where relevant).

At the time of writing this article SQA continue to make changes to National 5 and Higher courses and we are still awaiting final confirmation of what the requirements will be for each course. We are also awaiting the publication of deadlines from SQA with regards to coursework and estimated grades submission which in turn has made it difficult to set internal deadlines for the forthcoming year.

#### **Evidence Collection**

We have been informed that we will be required to submit a range of evidence to SQA to support school estimates and so we have planned assessment weeks where we can collect evidence of pupil progress throughout the year.

These assessment weeks will involve all senior pupils completing assessments under exam conditions. As all pupils at all levels will be sitting assessments this will allow a highly effective moderation process to take place within departments ensuring all recorded grades are as accurate a reflection on pupil ability as possible.

Evidence from assessment weeks alongside other pieces of evidence gathered over the year will be used to produce final estimated grades for National 5 courses ( and Higher courses should the exam diet not take place in 2021) and so pupils should make sure they prepare as fully as possible for these assessments.

The next assessment week for National 5 courses from 7-11th Dec, this time would normally be used for practice exams but as there are no national 5 exams this year this will be used as an evidence collection period. Two further assessment weeks will be scheduled when we receive deadline dates from SQA.

Higher pupils will sit a full prelim diet which will commence on the 1st Dec and run until the 17th Dec. The timetable for this will be published w/b the 16th November.

To help pupils with organising their time and revision schedules I have also produced an assessment calendar which is available to download on our website and shows all currently planned in class assessments based on the most up to date SQA course information. This will be updated as more information comes into school from SQA.

Candidate numbers and Entry certificates

Pupils will shortly be given a copy of their SQA entries to check. These will have their candidate number, address and all courses (with level) listed and these need to be checked and signed by the pupils to confirm all is correct. Pupils will be issued with these through PSE lessons so they can raise any concerns with their pastoral teacher if necessary.

# Pupil Attendance

ttendance at school is essential to ensure that all our pupils reach their full potential and maximise their attainment. If your child is absent from school for any reason then you must phone the school before 9.30am to inform us of the reason for their absence and they should also bring in a note to the school office on the first day of their return to school. If your child's attendance falls below an acceptable level you will receive attendance letters, phone calls from their pastoral care teacher and you may be invited into the school for a meeting to discuss your child's attendance and how we can work together to improve it.

Timekeeping is an important life skill which prepares our young people for the world of work. To improve timekeeping and keep you informed of your child's timekeeping there is a late book every morning where the reason for lateness and time of arrival are recorded. If your child is repeatedly late then you will be contacted by your child's pastoral care teacher who may put them on a timekeeping card and if this does not improve the timekeeping you will be invited to school for a meeting to discuss how we can work together to improve their timekeeping. If a pupil is 10 minutes late each day this is the equivalent of missing a full lesson each week.

Timekeeping is an important life skill which prepares our young people for the world of work.

# HEALTH & WELLBEING NEWS

This term has been an extremely challenging one for pupils and staff alike. The current guidance from Education Scotland and the Government is that all PE should take place outside. We have created a bespoke timetable with our limited outdoor facilities and tried to provide the best possible experience for our pupils. The response from the pupils has been amazing and they are just getting on with it as if it's the new normal.

As we go into winter the weather is only going to get worse – probably wetter and colder. As a result, it is important all pupils are prepared for this. To help us ensure all pupils are safe and healthy, please see the information below:

• Additional/appropriate clothing should be worn – extra layers, footwear (other than the shoes they wear to school)

• A change of socks may be appropriate

• Bring a plastic bag to put wet clothing/footwear in

• Staff will be making decision on a lesson by lesson basis regarding adverse weather e.g. stopping the lesson early in extremely wet conditions to come in and get warm and dry. Hairdryers have been purchased to help with this.

• Even if your child is injured, they should bring PE kit and they will be given an alternative role within the lesson e.g. referee, timekeeper, coach, equipment manager etc. This ensures all pupils will have dry uniform to change into.

While the situation is far from ideal, we will continue to make to best of it and I'm sure the pupils will continue to adapt as they always do. We welcome your support as parents/carers in preparing your child for PE days so that we can maximise teaching and learning with minimal disruptions.

#### **Home Economics Update**

As a practical subject, this term has been very challenging in Home Economics. We have put in place measures that minimise risk when cooking. At present, only S4-6 certificated classes are cooking. We hope to introduce cooking into S1-3 classes ASAP.

Each year we ask for a contribution from each pupil to supplement our expenditure on food and fabric. The money we collect enables us to enhance our pupils experience by providing a wider range of higher quality food and fabrics. We understand these are challenging times and that can include financial challenge. Please do not hesitate to get in touch with your child's Pastoral Support Teacher for a discreet discussion and we will do all we can to support. You can also speak to Miss Purves in Home Economics for further information. All payments should be made in cash to the pupils Home Economics teacher who will issue a receipt. Please note that pupils in receipt of free school meals are exempt from this payment.

For S4 pupils the payment is £20

For S5/6 pupils the payment is £25

We would be grateful if this could be paid by Friday 6th November. Thank you for your ongoing support.

# DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY NEWS

This year has seen different challenges for our team down in Design in Technology, but as always, our staff have been working hard to overcome these to ensure our learners have the best experience possible.

Having only joined the team in August, it has been an interesting start to a new school, with the department having to negotiate new health and safety rules, new equipment, processes and staffing we definitely had to hit the ground running.

One of our main priorities was the Health and Safety of our young people in the practical setting of the workshops. Some of the main measures we have introduced are our blue cleaning caddies, regular tool and equipment cleaning, hand sanitising and wearing masks in the high congestion areas of the department. Thankfully, our young people have adjusted to these practices well and have now incorporated them into their daily lessons. Another area we have had to develop is how we support young people in class, remotely from our teacher spaces in the room. This has proved to be challenging but in typical Technical Teacher style the staff have approached this with creativity and practically in equal measures. In most rooms we have been supported by the installation of projectors and staff have created bespoke visualisers to allow learners to see demonstrations from a distance. This has allowed us to ensure learners have clear instructions and support at an appropriate distance. I have been extremely impressed at the different approaches staff have developed with the visualisers to support learner engagement.

October also saw the department receiving a small face lift in our workshop areas, with notice boards being given an injection of colour and new displays throughout. Our displays have been developed to support learners in improving their tools, equipment, materials and processes knowledge in the workshop. They have also had a key role in support learners in understanding instruction from staff and problem-solving different tasks independently. Which we hope will continue to support their understanding, confidence and progress in the coming months.

Finally, the department have been working hard to make sure all learners have access to the online resources and homework they need to support their progress this year. We have been using Teams, Show My Homework and the "JHS At Home Learning" Website to provide pupils with tasks and supporting materials over the past few months. As such we would encourage parents and carer to support pupils in accessing these on a regular basis and if there are any access issues to let us know.

A final thanks to the dedicated Design and Technology staff for taking on the challenges of our current situation, and to the pupils for their patience and co-operation with our new learning routines.

## RELATIONSHIP POLICY UPDATE

A fter a very positive introduction to our Relationship Policy in session 2018 – 2019, we made some small changes to our policy this session. For example, under 'Safe' we have included 'follow physical distance measures'; under 'Ready' we have 'clean any required equipment' and under 'Respectful' we have 'respect

Similar to last year, our Promoting Positive Behaviour cycles work per the calendar month. All pupils who do not receive any more than one demerit throughout the month will receive a positive recognition text home to their parents or carers. In addition to monthly texts, termly certificates will also be distributed to pupils who receive no more than two demerits per term.

As we move through the ses-

sion, we will continue to refresh and update our Relationship Policy. As a next step, we are planning to develop Restorative Practice through further staff training. More information on this will follow in the next newsletter.

#### EXTRA CURRICULAR UPDATE

Normally at this time of year, the whole school extra curriculum programme would be distributed to pupils and parents. However, due to the current situation around Covid-19 and the guidelines that as a school we are to follow, it has been extremely challenging to provide any extra curricular opportunities for our pupils.

A number of members of staff are currently looking into the possibility of online or virtual extra curricular provision in addition to the Raising Attainment Booster Classes for the Senior Phase pupils.

Further information will come out soon and hopefully the restrictions will change in order that we can, at some point this session, provide the same opportunities that we always do.

Many activities have moved online, such as our Winter Leaver "My Future Pathway Programme". Each week via Microsoft Teams, pupils who wish to pursue a pathway into Construction, have the opportunity to receive support with CV's, Interview techniques, networking and achieving CSCS Cards.

Unfortunately, this year, we will not be able to host our annual Careers Fayre, however Renfrewshire wide online events are scheduled to take place over 4 months, which will see a 2-week slot dedicated to a business sector. Another exciting addition to our Employability suite of activities is our involvement in the Career Ready programme. S5 pupils received a presentation which highlighted the benefits of the programme: personal development, how to network, personal mentor from the world of work and a weeklong paid internship during summer 2021. This two-year programme empowers young people in S5/S6 to kick-start their chosen career through a series of authentic workplace experiences and a network of support - the only schools programme in Scotland, with the support of employers and volunteers. https://careerready.org.uk/scotland/
