A Word from Mrs Hollywood

Welcome to the summer edition of our school newsletter. I hope you find it an interesting read, and a way of keeping up to date with all the goings-on and achievements of our young people.

In terms of staffing news, Ms Brown has returned from her maternity leave, back into her role as PT Nurture and Mrs Merrick, PE, is due back on 3rd June as is Mrs Davidson, DHT. Mrs O'Malley was appointed acting HT, with effect from August 2024 when I take up a 23-month secondment with HMIE. Particular thanks to the two parent council members who supported the recruitment process. In April, Stephen Gorman joined our Senior Leadership Team (SLT) team as our new Education Support Manager, following the retirement of Mrs Lorraine Dick who had been in post for many years and will be much missed. Stephen has extensive experience of working in schools, and also in the Children's Services Resources Team.

In terms of staff who are finishing up at the end of term, Mrs Zych, Transition teacher, is due to return to her substantive post at Kilbarchan Primary school in August. Mr Duncan in Maths is moving to Park Mains High School and we wish him all the very best of luck. Mrs Smith (PT Learning Support) retires at summer and her post will be

taken on an acting capacity by Mrs Priestly (Inclusion teacher), starting in August. We are also saying a fond farewell to Mr Gilmour (PT Attainment) also retires in June. Mrs Smith has looked after youngsters in learning support for over 20 years and her expertise and knowledge is second to none. Mr Gilmour is a beloved Geography teacher who in recent years postponed retirement to set up and run all of our data systems that allow us to support young peoples' attainment. Both have made a massive contribution to the school and I, personally, will miss them very much as colleagues and friends.

School Improvement

Options evening took place on 27th February and thereafter learners in S2.4 and 5 had meetings with their house team to agree options for the forthcoming year. This year we have introduced electives to S5/6 and these have been well received. We hope that parents and carers have liked the new options form as it doesn't use columns and gives young people more choice. Furthermore, this session we also incorporated advice from departments on which subjects young people should be considering to maximise their attainment (i.e. what are your best 7 / 5 / 4 subjects).

We welcomed Emma Henry,

interim Head of Service, to the school in March to carry out the second of our annual attainment visits. This was a thorough session which involved a 'deep dive' into the attainment for our most recent (2023) leavers from across S4-6. The meeting went well as our leaver attainment is particularly strong; we are above the 'virtual' comparator in all but one measure. Furthermore, we have the strongest leaver destinations across Renfrewshire for the second year running at 99%. Janie O'Neill, the new Director of Children's services. visited the school in April. Janie met with the SLT, a group of staff, and a group of young people. She was very impressed when we heard all the great things happening in the school, our attainment and destinations, and the wide range of opportunities open to the young people.

We have been liaising with Renfrewshire Council about a new fence to go around the school to strengthen school security. This is progressing and I hope work will commence shortly. A full CCTV upgrade has been carried out and almost all corridors and stairwells are now covered. This is also an important school safety measure.

I have approved the purchase of a new school minibus. This cost comes from our 'capital items replacement fund' which is ringfenced monies for large scale investment. We have calculated finished off with a buffet and a that we should break even on this after three years due to the expense each time we have to hire a bus for a school trip/team event. The minibus should be with us in the next few months.

Life of the school

It's always busy in Johnstone High. As I write this article, there is an company specialising in Owls in the PE classroom doing talks for all of S1, with seven gorgeous owls for the young people to interact with and hold! You'll read about many events in this newsletter. but here are some of my faviourite moments from recent months.

In March we had all P7s into school for a fun Maths morning, and then again on a second day in March for a PE event. These are some of the many events that we put in place to familiarise the young people with high school.

Also in March, the Johnstone High senior freestyle band brought the house down at the new Paisley Town Hall as they closed the Renfrewshire Schools' Spring Concert. The same group won the Scottish Schools pipe band championships freestyle competition in March – listen to their wonderful performances on our X feed.

Our S6 finished up with us in fabulous fashion. First, we had Lapwing Lodge on 17th April and the pupils had a great time doing activities such as archery, high ropes and Sumo/ Gladiators. The next day was the S6 graduation which is a highlight in our calendar. We had a rehearsal in the afternoon, then the event after school. Although 'formal' it is a warm and emotional event, and a sense of strong community and family permeates. We

blether, and a great time was had by all. Finally, we had the S6 shirt signing day on Friday 19th April. Yet again, the S6 did us proud with their conduct which was exemplary and finished off a brilliant year for them. Photos are on 'X'.

On Friday 10th May, Miss McGinley and myself, along with Luke and Kate, represented Johnstone High at the 100-year rededication of the Johnstone War Memorial in Houston Sq. We met lots of dignitaries and former pupils, including a lady who told us she was in a pupil in the school when the current JHS school badge was designed and introduced - in 1959!

- Well done to our girls' football team who took part in the Scottish National Finals in March and won 2, drew 5 against some of the best competition from across Scotland.
- Hive 25, our Young Enterprise group, won the Best Business Report, Best Renfrewshire Team, and Best Overall Regional Team at the YE Regional Finals in March. National Finals, here we come!
- Renfrewshire Young Musician of the Year took place on 17th April and I am delighted that our school representative, Logan, was a very worthy second place. A supremely talented and dedicated musician, Logan is no stranger to performing competitively and we are very proud of him.
- At the end of April our junior volleyball team won at the Renfrewshire volleyball

tournament.

- House awards were sent home in April as a thank you for young people who had achieved high numbers of badges on Satchel One - plus an Easter Egg at the end of last term for those who were the top two for Satchel one points in each class S1-3.
- Well done to Nate who swam at the Grangemouth Falkirk Otters Swim Meet on the 4th May, picking up 3 x Golds, 2 x Silvers and 1 x Bronze. Nate picked up the trophy for Top Boy in his age category.

Our wider achievement awards (for all the extras that pupils do, both in and out of the classroom) and S1-3 awards will take place in June. Senior awards will take place in August.

Expectations around behaviour and conduct

Parent and carer support is so important to us to make sure our children and young people achieve their best. A good example of this is attainment, for example, parents and carers supporting revision and homework; however, it can also apply to behaviour and conduct.

Whilst the vast majority of our pupils live up to our expectations and demonstrate our values, we are particularly concerned about the following:

- 1.Uniform: standards of uniform are not as they were at the start of the school session. Pupils should be in a shirt and tie, wearing trousers or a skirt. PE kit, leggings, trackies etc are not part of our uniform and we will challenge pupils who come to school wearing these items as they do not look like they are part of our school community. Uniform is essential for us to keep our school safe as it helps us to more easily identify intruders. We will also support pupils with uniform, and everyday we hand out items of school uniform to pupils who require them. Your support in this regard is very much appreciated.
- 2.Phones: we are actively in the process of ordering phone caddies for every classroom. Once these have arrived, we will communicate with you and the young people about our plans to get phones out of classrooms. Many schools in Renfrewshire and across the UK have already taken this step. Phones are a constant

source of disruption in the classroom, and sadly this outweighs their usefulness as learning tools. Furthermore, we are increasingly seeing young people who are demonstrating the signs of being addicted to their phone, which I'm sure we can all agree is very worrying.

3. Vaping: we have supervision around the milling area, back path, local community and toilet areas, however we are concerned about the number of pupils of all ages who are vaping. When we find a pupil has been vaping, we will confiscate the item and put an appropriate sanction in place. For your information, vapes are very similar to highlighter pens. Some are crystal in appearance. Please speak to your child about vaping – it's much more common amongst the younger generation than we, as adults, would suspect.

4. Absence and latecoming: I prioritise attendance and time keeping as they are vital life skills and essential for the world of work. Please support the school, and your child's attainment and future prospects, by making sure they get into good habits and come to school every day and on time. We have a range of supports that can be put in place to support attendance and timekeeping. In our experience, these have maximum impact when we work in close partnership with parents and carers.

5. Following instructions and manners: a very small number of pupils present staff with challenge on a regular basis. This can include dodging lessons to truant in areas of the school, lack of manners, not following instructions, even to swearing and being verbally abusive to staff.

We are really supportive of

our pupils and work hard to give them a curriculum and package of support that meets their needs. We also understand that many young people have difficult situations in their lives and need their adults to be mindful of this. However, part of supporting young people to learn to regulate their emotions and behave in a socially appropriate way means that adults have to put consequences in place. We are always grateful when we contact parents about behaviour to have a productive, mutually supportive conversation where we focus on solutions and work in partnership.

We will continue to have the highest expectations for our young people and will always rely on parental support. JOHNSTONE HIGH SCHOOL FOCUS ON ATTENDANCE

At Johnstone High School we want every pupil to attend school regularly and have a positive school experience where they can achieve to the best of their ability.

Since the pandemic there has been a drop in school attendance both locally and nationally. We are currently updating our attendance policy and are working with parents, pupils and staff to ensure that our policy works for our school community. There are many supports in school to help with attendance and letting us know at the earliest stage possible that your child is struggling will help us put the most appropriate support package in place.

A 10% drop in attendance is the equivalent of missing half a day per week. Over the whole school year this adds up to 19 days of missed education. This is the same as missing 4 weeks House Group Pastoral Teacher of education in a year.

At Johnstone High School if a young person's attendance drops by 10% in the senior phase they will on average attain 2 fewer National 5 qualifications or 4 fewer National 4 qualifications by the time they leave school compared to their peers with higher average attendance at school.

We want all our young people to be in school as much as possible because in addition to gaining qualifications there are many more activities in school which help develop other important life skills that will prepare them for the world of work. We have extra-curricular clubs, school trips and leadership opportunities that all pupils can get involved in to help develop these important skills.

ATTAINMENT UPDATE

At Johnstone High School our commitment to ensuring that every young person reaches their full potential remains unwavering, and we are proud to report significant progress in several key areas.

Johnstone High continues to perform above our virtual comparator in terms of tariff points, attainment versus deprivation, and literacy and numeracy. This achievement reflects our relentless approach to supporting all young people and ensuring they have the opportunities and resources needed to succeed.

Our strategy includes both universal and targeted support to cater to the diverse needs of our pupils. We believe that every young person has the capacity to excel, and we are dedicated to providing the necessary interventions and support systems to help them achieve their goals.

To further enhance our support for our young people, we have introduced GL assessments in literacy, numeracy and CAT4 for our S1 pupils. These tests provide robust information that helps us tailor learning and teaching strategies within the classroom. By understanding each pupils' strengths and areas for development, we can offer more personalised

support.

This session we have developed our tracking, monitoring and reporting framework within the Broad General Education (BGE) phase. Our new reporting framework indicates whether a pupil is beginning, progressing, or achieving a curricular level. This detailed reporting enables us to set precise targets for each pupil to reach by the end of the year, creating a clear progression pathway into the Senior Phase. This has enhanced our formal calendar of learner conversations, allowing each pupil to understand their progress in each subject. This approach ensures that our young people are aware of their current progression and what they need to focus on to achieve their full potential.

Our S3 pupils have recently completed their Scottish National Standardised Assessments (SNSA) in Literacy and Numeracy. The data from these assessments will be instrumental in informing our planning for learning and teaching. This ensures that our educational approaches are data-driven and focused on meeting the specific needs of our students. Furthermore, our S3 Assessment Week provided valuable data that

informs teaching strategies and targeted support, ensuring that each pupil's learning needs are addressed as they progress towards the Senior Phase and National Qualifications.

Thank you for your ongoing support and partnership in ensuring the success of every young person at Johnstone High School.

Raising Attainment Booster Sessions & Easter School

In preparation for the recent exam diet, we offered a comprehensive range of Raising Attainment Booster Classes (RABS) and an Easter School program, thanks to the incredible dedication and support of our staff.

The Raising Attainment Booster Classes were designed to provide focused support to our S4-S6 students, targeting areas of the curriculum that they may have found challenging. These additional sessions allowed our young people to receive targeted guidance, clarify their understanding, and reinforce their knowledge in preparation for their exams. In total there was 96 RAB classes offered across the curriculum in March and April.

Furthermore, our Easter School program offered an intensive and immersive learning experience during the holiday period. This initiative provided a structured environment for pupils to consolidate their learning.

The purpose of both the Raising Attainment Booster Classes and the Easter School was to equip our pupils with the necessary skills and support to sit their

final exams with confidence. By addressing specific areas of challenge and providing additional practice opportunities, we aimed to ensure that our young people felt well-prepared and capable of demonstrating their true potential..

As we reflect on the recent exam diet, we are proud of the efforts of our young people and the support provided by our staff.

Options 2024/ Timetable

As part of our ongoing quest to improve pupils experience at school we decided to move to a "free" options choice this year with our S2, S4 and S5 pupils making informed options based on career pathways and previous performance in a subject all without the restrictions of options columns.

This change, along with several others in relation to the options

process, has proved to be very positive with only a small number of pupils having to adjust their options. Any pupil who will be affected by these changes will be contacted and alternative options discussed.

We are continuing to try to secure places for some Advanced Higher subjects at other schools thought the authority's consortium arrangements. As and when these arrangements are confirmed we will let pupils know.

This year we have been able to secure a college course for Hair and Beauty SCQF level 4, for some of our new S4 pupils, which will be delivered in school.

The new timetable will start on

Monday the 3rd of June with pupils being issued these during period 1 on the Monday. More information on which classes to attend period 1 will be shared with pupils and will be available on the schools web site.

YOUNG LEADERS OF LEARNING

This year Johnstone High School is one of a few schools in Renfrewshire Council to have been invited by Education Scotland to try out a new way of including children and young people in school improvement. In June 2023, we looked to recruit some pupils from S1-3 to take part in this programme. The Young Leaders of Learning will be involved in working with young people from a partner school to identify what is working well and where improvements can be made. In its essence, pupils are getting an exciting opportunity to directly lead and impact on a section of each school's improvement plan. Johnstone High's Young Leaders of Learning have been paired with Renfrew High School and mentored by Mrs Cole (DHT) and Mr Smith (Project Leader Learning & Teaching).

This exciting programme supports the following articles from the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child: Article 12 (respect for the views of the child): "Every child has the right to express their views, feelings and wishes in all matters affecting them, and to have their views considered and taken seriously. This right applies at all times, for example during immigration proceedings, housing decisions

or the child's day-to-day home life." And article 13 (freedom of expression): "Every child must be free to express their thoughts and opinions and to access all kinds of information."

At this early stage, the pupils from each respective school have met within Johnstone High School and had a productive working lunch. This meeting saw pupils getting to know one another and sharing thoughts and ideas about what areas of school life could have improvements made. Conversations surrounded both schools' relationship policies, teaching and learning, corridor displays and the embedding of careers into the curriculum. It turns out that excellent ideas can be shared over a Domino's pizza! Going forward, the two

schools will come together again, prior to Christmas, to establish the focus of the group. Once a vision has been created, pupilled inspections of each school will take place and then we will be able to implement the pupil's findings as a project for improvement.







YOUNG ENTERPRISE UPDATE

This year 25 very hard working and enthusiastic S6 pupils are engaging with the Young Enterprise Company Programme. As the largest team in Johnstone High history, they have embraced this experience and grown both as a team and as individuals.

The team (Hive25) are a colony of 25 "Busy Bee's" who have taken inspiration from natures true entrepreneur, the BEE. Like the BEE, they have worked to create something beautiful from natural resources all while giving back to the community and environment.

"Our goal was to have some fun, engage with our local community, make some profit all while supporting the now struggling bee population. We had some wins early on which clouded our judgement and made us possibly underestimate the challenges to come. As we progressed through this programme, we rode the highs and managed the many lows as a team."

To get started Hive25 had to decide on a logo, a product and









raise some start up funds. To raise the initial startup capital the team held bake sales each week with each member of the team donating goods. This enabled them to raise £230 required to kick start their venture. However, deciding on a product to sell was not

initially easy for Hive25. After a period of research, creation of a prototype, and some failed attempts the team voted unanimously to focus their attentions on developing a range of handmade, organic, cruelty free, vegan, non-toxic solid scents. They quickly

got to work and managed to produce and sell over 400 units in December alone.

In December 2023 they sold at nine events across the local community and in one instance made it to three events in one day showing their commitment to this project. One event was the Braehead Trade Fayre run by Young Enterprise. Hive25 received high praise from customers, judges, and all in attendance. The team did themselves proud and made a significant number of sales. Their stall impressed so much that they won the Runner Up for the Best Trade Stand, out of the 15 teams competing that evening and the team were rightly very proud of themselves.

In March they attended the Young Enterprise Company Finals competing against schools from across Renfrewshire, East Renfrewshire, and Inverclyde. For this part of the competition the team had to submit a Business Report, give a presentation about their journey, and participate in group interviews. At the event our presentation team of Jamie

Young and Ben McKay were incredible and would have absolutely secured investment had they been in Dragons Den.

Again, Hive25 impressed the judges and won 4 of the 9 awards that were up for grabs.

how they would promote the business, ensure it was ethical, sustainable and that it environmentally responsible. On the day of the final our young people travelled to the Prince's Trust Headquarters in Glasgow where they delivered a confident and considered presentation. We came a very close second in the final challenge and received incredibly positive feedback

from the judges. Our young people did us proud! Well done to Amy, Nathan, Harry and Findlay.

In March a group of young people took part in Stage 1 of the Prince's Trust Enterprise Challenge. Competing in teams of 2-5, the young people played an online business game called Pop-Up, a business simulation game that puts young people in charge of starting and running a brand-new pop-up business. 56 school across Scotland took part in this stage, with over 1300 young people participating. From this the 5 highest scoring schools were invited to the Regional Final, and thanks to some amazing enterprising skills Johnstone High was one of them.

We were invited to develop an idea for a social enterprise and pitch it to a panel of judges who would then invest £1000 in the winning business. Our group of 4 amazing pupils put together a high-quality pitch that detailed their idea of running a coffee shop for Johnstone High staff. This would involve pupils would working towards a qualification in barista skills as well as developing customer service skills. The enterprise group described

And they're off!

Over two years in the planning and it's now all but time to depart for Nepal. Previous trips to Nepal (2013), Borneo (2015), Tanzania (2017) and India (2019) have been deeply rewarding and immensely successful. Only Covid stopped us in our tracks on the way to Bolivia in 2021.

For some of the challengers the reality of the impending trip is only now hitting home as the questions come in thick and fast at the last minute. What's a compression sack? What's paracord? Are we going to love momos and dhal bat? Should I start fitness training now?

We are going back where it all began on our first World Challenge experience which took place in summer 2013, when a group comprising solely S6 pupils visited Nepal and took part in a community project in Pokhara with a trek in the Annapurna mountain range, culminating in the summit of Poon Hill.



This time, the first couple of days in Kathmandu and Pokhara should help in the acclimatisation as challengers prepare for some long and tough days trekking at altitude in the Himalaya. That's where we'll find out what "yeah, yeah, I've been getting loads of hiking practice in" means in reality. There's no doubt that the trekking will be tough – but awesome at the same time.

The local community in Pokhara will be the focus of the next stage after trekking. In the past, teaching English and Maths, painting school gyms, plastering and the construction of classrooms and the creation of play areas and vegetable gardens were some of the items on the agenda for the challengers to get stuck into for

a few days. We have always been given the warmest of welcomes by the local people (and the stray dogs......) who love to mix with the visitors.

The last week sees some time for rest and relaxation. Challengers may choose to soak themselves through white water rafting or explore the many and varied sights of Kathmandu.

Overall, a fabulous learning experience in an entirely different culture.


The Renfrewshire School's Pipe Band, strongly represented by JHS pupils competed at the Gourock Games in May. The band received the following prizes;

Magic Breakfast

Magic Breakfast @ Johnstone High Served Daily 0800-0830

At the start of the school year in August we began working in partnership with The Magic Breakfast. This is a charitable organisation which supports breakfast provision in schools throughout the UK.

Recently we were selected to be part of a research project commissioned by Magic breakfast and conducted by Blake Stevenson, a market research company based in Edinburgh. This looked at what could be done to improve the number of pupils using this service in the school. This project ran from the start of February until the end of March 2024 and involved a change in the foods being offered.

During the project we offered a "new menu" with themed days, these were:

Multigrain Mondays, with multigrain bagels, breads, cereals and 3 flavours of porridge.

Pancake Tuesdays, with scotch pancakes.

Weggensday, with scrambled eggs.



Tattie Scone Thursday Beans Friday.

We have looked at the data from attendance and portions served, with 2 groups of pupils and a staff group meeting with Jennifer Lambert, a Director with Blake Stevenson, to give their views. The pupils, as always, were outstanding with their input and impressed Jennifer.

We will be taking this feedback and suggestions forward, looking to improve what we offer and plan to develop the breakfast further.

So far we have started working with the school Librarian, Joyce who is coming in on Wednesday mornings to help with the breakfast but also promote reading. A selection of books will also be available every day.

The Breakfast will be available from 8am in the Home Economics room opposite Ms Barry everyday and is free for

all pupils.

Trays will be made available at the late desk, nurture, inclusion and learning support.

So far we are very proud of what we have achieved and want to develop further. What has been attained with a core group of staff volunteering on a rota and pupils offering their support is astounding.

We have had 7112 young people sign into the room.

During the research period (2 months) we provided –

2361 bagels, 454 crumpets, 66 loaves of bread, used 59.5kg of butter, 35 tubs of cream cheese, 1905 pieces of fruit, 158 pancakes, 57 eggs, 164 potato scones, and 28 tins of beans.

Again this would not be possible without the support of staff, management, The Magic Breakfast, Parent Council and of course the pupils who not only use the breakfast but help us by volunteering themselves in the morning.

MENTAL HEALTH MENTORS

A Big thank you to all the JHS Mental Health Mentors who have helped at numerous school events throughout the year. Firstly, we had Active Communities in to deliver basic mental health training, followed by our Santa Dash which considering the weather everyone kept in high spirits! We then focussed on Mental Health Week at the start of February, consisting of staff vs pupil football match, Just Dance sessions, slime making, biscuit decorating and kinetic sand! Senior mentors also delivered an assembly to BGE pupils on 'My Voice Matters' - great experience for all. In June, ten mentors have signed up for the 'Mindful Mentor's' programme run by Rainbow Park Yoga where they will learn basic mindfulness, meditation, and yoga techniques to support the overall wellbeing of pupils at JHS.





War Memorial Re-Dedication May 2024

On Friday May 10th, S5 pupil Kate McEwan and S6 Leaver Luke Palmer accompanied Miss McGinley and Mrs Hollywood to the rededication of the Houston Square War Memorial in Johnstone. The occasion marked 100 years since the war memorial was unveiled in the town.

Placed in the middle of the town square is a tall statue of an infantryman standing with a rifle, which was erected in May of 1924 to commemorate those who died during the First World War. The memorial also stands to remember those who died during WW2 and subsequent conflicts.

As time has passed, the monument has become a place of remembrance to pay tribute to those who died in all conflicts, with the bronze statue having wreaths laid at it on Remembrance Day events. Members from the council, local primary schools and representatives from the police and fire service were all in attendance.

The community were invited

to hold a moment of reflection and people with wreaths were invited to lay them at the foot of the memorial.

Councillor Lorraine Cameron, Renfrewshire's Lord Provost, during her speech said: "As we stand here today, we're not merely observers of the past, but custodians of the future, and it's our responsibility to ensure that the sacrifices of those who came before us are never forgotten and that their courage and valour continue to inspire generations."


The Digital Committee have evaluated our current school website and identified where updates are required. They have also been researching what they would like to see more of on the website, so this continues to be under construction.

Librarian secured a successful Live Literature part-funding by Scottish Book Trust and rest from the library budget to host Victoria Williamson's visit on 5 March for S1. She actively engaged pupils with her new novel 'Norah's Ark' about poverty, homelessness, cost of living crisis and understanding animal behaviours.

a new project, Libraries Lyt Up Lives a project in collaboration with One Ren and Glasgow Life libraries, funded by Scottish Libraries and Information Council. 3 authors - Graeme Armstrong, Alan Bissett and Brian Conaghan will be visiting 12 schools in Renfrewshire (6 high schools) and Glasgow (6 high schools). Through this project we had Brian Conaghan on 13 March for S3, he shared an inspiring life story of a 19-year old who couldn't read to how he became an author of 9 books. We will also be having Graeme Armstrong (author of Young Team) on 10 June and Allan Bissett (author of Lads) on 11 June.

We had Victoria Gemmell and Nadine Aisha Jassat as part of Paisley Book Festival's school programme. Victoria Gemmell on 23 April hosted a creative writing workshop for S2 to encourage budding writers. Nadine Aisha Jassat gave a talk about her new book 'The Hidden Story of Estie Noor' on 25 April and activities to inspire story tellers through creative poetry writing.



PARENT PAY SYSTEM

Making secure payments online using your credit or debit card

ParentPay offers you the freedom to make payments whenever and wherever you like, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week - safe in the knowledge that the technology used is of the highest internet security available.

You will have a secure online account, activated using a unique username and password; you will be prompted to change these, and to keep them safe and secure.

Making a payment is straightforward and ParentPay holds a payment history for you to view at a later date; no card details are stored in any part of the system. Once you've activated your account you can make online payments straight away.

How do free school meals work?

Pupils entitled to free school meals will have their ParentPay account credited each day. Because all account types are accessed in the same way, whether paid for or free, the new system allows those pupils receiving free school

meals to remain completely anonymous.

Free school meal credit balances will not be carried over to the next day.

Using PayPoint

PayPoint payments are recorded by ParentPay and can be seen by logging into your ParentPay account and viewing your payment history online.

When can I log in to my account?

Once you have received your activation letter from school with your activation login details you'll be able to activate your account and start making payments. This letter will be sent to you soon by your school.
