# **Expectations** around behaviour and conduct

Parental support is so important to us to make sure our children and young people achieve their best. A good example of this is attainment, for example, parents supporting revision and homework; however, it can also apply to behaviour and conduct.

Along with many other schools, we are noticing that postlockdown, some of our young people are struggling with behaviour. Whilst the vast majority of our pupils live up to our expectations and demonstrate our values, we are noticing some troubling patterns of misbehaviour.

We are particularly concerned about the following:

1.Vaping: we have increased our levels of supervision around the milling area, back path and toilets, however we are concerned about the number of pupils of all ages who are vaping. When we find a pupil has been vaping, we will confiscate the item and put an appropriate sanction in place.

For your information, vapes are very similar to highlighter pens. Some are crystal in appearance. The photo shows some that we have confiscated recently.

Please speak to your child about vaping – it's much more common amongst the younger generation than we, as adults, would suspect.



2.Absence and latecoming: one particular morning, late October, I had over 50 young people come into school late. I'm worried that there are some families where lateness is becoming a habit that is hard to break out of. I have also signed letters for a number of S5/6 pupils who have less than 75% attendance at school. This is more than one day off per week.

We are also aware that there are some young people who are truanting during the day and dodging particular classes. Pastoral will be in touch with any parent where this is a problem for their child.

I prioritise attendance and time keeping as it is a vital life skill and essential for the world of work. Please support the school, and your child's future prospects, by making sure they get into good habits and come to school every day and on time. We have a range of supports and sanctions that can be put in place to support attendance and timekeeping. In our experience, these have maximum impact when we work in close partnership with parents

and carers.

3.Following instructions and manners: a very small number of pupils present staff with challenge on a regular basis. This can range from lack of manners, to not following instructions, to swearing. We are incredibly supportive of our pupils and work hard to give them a curriculum and package of support that meets their needs. We also understand that many young people have difficult situations in their lives and need their adults to be mindful of this. However, part of supporting young people to learn to regulate their emotions and behave in a socially appropriate way means that adults have to put consequences in place. We are extremely grateful when we contact parents about behaviour to have a productive, mutually supportive conversation where we focus on solutions and work in partnership.

We will continue to have the highest expectations for our young people, and will always rely on your support. If you would like to contact us about any aspect of behaviour management (for issues at school or indeed, in the family home) please contact your child's pastoral teacher on 0300 300 1331.

## **CURRICULAR CONSULTATION**

Last year we conducted an extensive consultation with staff, pupils and parents /carers to widen our curricular offer in the Senior Phase (S4 – S6) in to provide a broader choice of pathways at SCQF Levels 5 & 6.

The positive impact of this enhanced Senior Phase offer has led us to review our BGE courses and our curriculum structure, again with a view to maximising progression opportunities, achievement and attainment.

Our current curriculum structure follows this model:

\*The number of subjects chosen in S6 depends on the level:

3 all at level 7/Advanced Higher

4-5 at level 5/National 5, level 6/Higher and/or level 7/ Advanced Higher

Maths and English have 4

periods a week in S1&S2, curricular subjects Modern Languages, Social Subjects, Science and PE all have 3 periods a week in S1 & S2, Home Economics, Art, Design & Technology, Music, Computing & Business, PSE and RE have 2 periods per week in S1 & S2.

In S3 Maths and English have 4 periods a week, chosen subjects have 3 periods a week and core subjects PE has 2 periods a week and PSE and RE have 1 period a week.

In S4 all chosen subjects, including Maths and English, have 4 periods a week, PE and PSE have 2 periods a week and RE has 1 period per week.

We are proposing to move to a different curriculum structure which would allow for more time in chosen courses at the end of S2, thus allowing for a deeper coverage of course content, which would positively impact on attainment and achievement, and potentially provide the opportunity to achieve wider accreditation. The proposed curriculum structure would follow this model:

There would be no change to the period allocation in S1&S2, but in S3 pupils would move to 7 chosen subjects with 4 periods in each and would have 2 periods of core PE, 1 period of core PSE, RE and Modern Languages. In S4 they would continue with these same choices but would not have to continue with core Modern Languages, alternative choices would be offered for that period.

A consultation with staff and the Parent Council has already been conducted with an overwhelmingly positive response to moving to the proposed structure.

# PUPIL ATTENDANCE

ttendance at school is essential to ensure that all our pupils reach their full potential and maximise their attainment. If your child is absent from school for any reason then you must phone the school before 9.30am to inform us of the reason for their absence and they should also bring in a note to the school office on the first day of their return to school. If your child's attendance falls below an acceptable level you will receive attendance letters, phone calls from their pastoral care teacher and you may be invited into the school for a meeting to discuss your child's attendance and how we can work together to improve it.

Timekeeping is an important life skill which prepares our young people for the world of work. To improve timekeeping and keep you informed of your child's timekeeping there is a late book every morning where the reason for lateness and time of arrival are recorded. If your child is repeatedly late then you will be contacted by your child's pastoral care teacher who may put them on a timekeeping card and if this does not improve the timekeeping you will be invited to school for a meeting to discuss how we can work together to improve their timekeeping. If a pupil is 10 minutes late each day this is the equivalent of missing a full lesson each week.

Timekeeping is an important life skill which prepares our young people for the world of work.

# ATTAINMENT UPDATE

#### Ms Davidson Acting Depute Head

We are delighted to report that, overall, attainment continues to improve at Johnstone High. After a difficult two years for our young people, they finally had the opportunity to return to the exam hall and demonstrate their ability through a typical exam diet. An increased number of pupils also opted to engage in internally assessed courses and the success of this alternative pathway has also shone through in our results data.

In 2022, young people in Johnstone High were presented for more qualifications than ever before. This demonstrates that our alternative curriculum model supports all pupils to maximise their attainment potential through a wide range of engaging subjects and at appropriate levels.

We have also seen significant improvements in our breadth and depth figures, with 49% of young people now achieving 5 or more level 5 (Nat 5) qualifications in S4, compared to just 37% in 2019.

In Literacy and Numeracy, we

have also made significant improvements in the number of pupils leaving school with these qualifications at Level 4 or 5. At both levels, and in all senior phase year groups, we perform better than our virtual comparator (a virtual cohort of pupils from schools with similar socio-economic characteristics).

This improvement journey is testament to the school's drive to continuously improve teaching and learning at all levels and build a relevant Senior Phase curriculum offer. It is also down to the hard work and dedication of teaching staff, parents and pupils. We are proud of what we have achieved together and look forward to continuing this journey as a school community.

# DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY UPDATE

#### Miss Smith PT Design & Technology

It has been a busy Autumn Term this year with learners in the Design & Technology Department working hard on their coursework, developing their curricular knowledge, practical skills, and career education. We have been delighted to be able to celebrate our learners' successes through Pupil of the Month, Pupil Showcases on the department digital display and Twitter. Below we have some highlights from this session.

S1 Oblique Sketching and Bird Feeders

Our S1 learners have been working hard on new specialist skills in Design & Technology, with a focus on Oblique Sketching and the construction of their mixed material Bird Feeders. Completing their Oblique sketching unit has allowed learners to develop their spatial awareness, freehand sketching skills and problem solving skills. With the Birdfeeder focusing on tools, equipment, cutting/shaping, assembly and finishing processes in their practical time. It has also allowed for meaningful discussion on sustainability with regards to material use and scarcity of resources such as food for birds in winter.

S2 Isometric Sketching and Trinket Boxes



S2 have successfully completed their isometric sketching unit building on their sketching skills from last session to create accurate 3D sketches of basic forms. In the workshop they have also been working hard on cutting, shaping and assembling their own Trinket Boxes. With most learners gaining the opportunity to personalise their lids by using the laser cutter to decorate the lid during their finishing processes.

Design & Manufacture

Practical construction and modelling skills have been a strong feature in this sessions S3 and S4 Design and Manufacture classes. S3 have been using their modelling skills to support the re-design of games controllers, allowing them to take their knowledge of Design Factors and apply them to a real life sketch model of their design concepts. Similarly S4 have been working hard on constructing their Practical Coursework Models in the form of their Birdhouses. This has allowed learners to experience a variety of machines and processes to support not only their practical skills but their manufacturing knowledge.

#### NPA Silversmithing & Jewellery

The Silversmithing class have been working steadily through their introduction course developing their skills in surface texture's, finishes, piercing, edge finishing and forming techniques. Samples of each of these techniques will be produced to contribute to their assessment and allow for them to create personalised pieces of jewellery. Later in the month the class will be attending a Workshop at Kelvin College to support their NPA Jewellery Skills development and to experience a professional workshop environment. We look forward to their feedback on the experience and to see what they manufacture.

#### NPA Construction Skills

Our learners have been working hard on their joinery unit of work in construction skills and have successfully completed their window frames, surrounds and glazing. They were provided with a working drawing of the project allowing them to measure and mark out the window to an accurate size. Learners then cut, shaped, and fitted each of the desired joints to allow for assembly and finishing. This process has allowed them to develop their workshop practice, hand skills and employability skills. We are currently organising a construction skills excursion to Edinburgh College to attend a construction competition and workshop where we hope learners will further deepen their understanding and skills in this field.









# **MATHS DEPT** *UPDATE*

#### Mrs McKay PT Mathematics

This year we welcomed Mr Duncan to the department. Mr Duncan has been a great addition to our team and has already made a great impact in the department.

We have also introduced two new courses, Level 4/5 Personal Finance and Level 5/6 Maths for Engineering. Both courses allow students to work towards gaining a Level 4/5/6 Numeracy award. These are alternative courses to the more traditional pathways which have allowed our young people to continue gaining skills which are relevant to real life situations.

#### Maths Week

Maths Week Scotland is a celebration of the importance of maths in our everyday lives. All year groups were involved in different types of activities. BGE enjoyed learning about the story of number 1, deciphering secret messages, treasure hunts, statistical environmental quizzes and competing against other teams to complete Maths relays. Some of our BGE took part in the sumdog challenge, trying to complete 1000 questions in the week! Some of our SP pupils were shown video interviews with people studying Maths, Science, Engineering and Displaying Data in Finance. It was great to get chatting about potential careers in Maths. . There was a real buzz in the

department and all pupils showed great team work and communication skills. As well as this, departments across the school highlighted which Maths/Numeracy skill is used within their subject helping pupils see the links between the subjects.

#### Maths Primary Transition Event

The Maths department were delighted to welcome all associated primary schools to our STEM and Maths relay challenge on Friday 30th September. Great team work and enthusiasm were shown by every pupil. The STEM challenge involved teams building the highest tower with only one piece of paper and some Cellotape! During the relay section of the morning, pupils had to work together to complete Numeracy questions whilst racing against other schools. So much fun was had by all. In the end, Auchenlodment Primary came out in first place gaining the most amount of correct answers. Well done to the winning team! The Numeracy skills shown by all schools were very impressive! We look forward to welcoming the all back to the department at the end of the year! A big thank you to our S6 volunteers for helping keep track of the marks!

#### Under 13s Boys

The new Under-13 Boys' team had their first game in September. #### The SCQF (Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework) School Ambassador programme offers schools the opportunity to learn more about the benefits of the SCQF and the wider ways in which it supports learners.

Such as recognising wider achievement, developing Senior Phase learning pathways in line with the Developing the Young Workforce strategy and giving equality between vocational and academic gualifications.

#### **Our Journey**

We have recently recruited SCQF Ambassadors at Johnstone High School who are undergoing a training programme and working on developing SCQF awareness with their peers through the curriculum. These pupils will also present at Information/ Options evenings, have stalls at parent/carer evenings and raise awareness of SCQF across the whole school community.

The school has this year embarked on its SCQF journey to reach Silver. With the great help of our S6 SCQF Ambassadors we have been able to contribute to the Senior Information Night and P7 Parents' Night. We look forward to more opportunities to engage with parents throughout the year and are excited for our S6 SCQF Ambassadors to start their SCQF training journey. We hope that by the end of this school year you will all be able to visibly see the impact of our SCQF Ambassadors work and our school's ambition to reach our silver award.

#### Changes to Curriculum

As part of our SCQF journey we identified that the Senior Phase subject options were very traditional and mostly featured National and Higher courses which are only some of the Level 5 and 6 courses available to young people. As such we looked at diversifying our curricular offer, creating new course options and sharing with our learners what each of these courses entail. This involved a subject "Taster Day" where learners could try the new subject areas, new options information presentations and finally an options "dummy run" including new subject options such as National Progression Awards (NPAs) to seek out the needs ànd wánts of our learners. As a result of this we now have a much wider curricular offer this session with more than 11 new subjects running this session.

#### **SCQF** Awareness

The ambassador team are looking to raise awareness with their peers in school, with parent/carers, staff and wider partners. To support this, we have created a section on our school website to share information.

We are delighted to be accredited as a Vision School for Holocaust Education in Scotland – the second school in Renfrewshire to be successfully recognised.

A Vision School is one committed to the view that learning about the Holocaust is a vital part of a young person's education. To receive the award, schools must demonstrate their existing commitment to the importance of Holocaust education and to developing teacher knowledge to ensure continued expertise in this subject matter.

Earlier this year we submitted our Level 1 Application and in August, Dr Andrew Killen (Depute Director of Vision Schools) visited the school and confirmed we had successfully met the criteria. Our very positive feedback from Paula Cowan of UWS and Director of the Vision Schools for Scotland programme, included the following:

"This well-organised submission skilfully narrated the progress made towards embedding Holocaust education across the School. Key strengths are the School's detailed and imaginative RME programme, the embedding of Holocaust across most of the secondary stages and transferring Holocaust lessons to online delivery during COVID-19. Resources used in this submission were consistently well chosen and integrating the Holocaust into Psychology teaching is original. Staff are committed to embedding the Holocaust into the curriculum in a meaningful and memorable way."

On the 9th of February 2023, Miss McGinley, Mrs Hollywood and 2 JHS pupils will attend the annual Vision Schools Scotland award ceremony at Scottish Parliament. We look forward to liaising with other successful Vision Schools and continuing our Vision Schools journey this session.

This year Johnstone High School is continuing to work closely with our S6 pupils to help them achieve a Saltire Award.
